Which Kills the Colorado Species.

This is particularly pleasant news this season, for if this year's potato crop had to withstand the usual ravages of the voraclous Colorado beetle the prespective supply of popular ages of the voracious Colorado beetie the prospective supply of popular tubers for this season might be an-nihilated. The insect to which Mr. McKone has called attention in some respects resembles the milk weed leaf respects resembles the mink weet lear beetle and is distinguished by various markings, some black and brown, some red, others black and green, and some even green and white. It possesses a long, sharp antenna by means of which it pierces the shell

of the potato bug and sucks out its

A Turn to Bugs.

It naturally prefers the young Colorado beetle, but if these cannot be found on the plant the insect will even attack the full grown potato bugs.

This useful little insect has, it is said, never appeared before in this district, and Mr. McKone is not yet certain as to the particular species and variety of the welcome newcomer.

# A FINE OF \$100 OR FINE OF \$20?

Important Discovery of a Beetle This Is the Question Which Agitated the Police Court Today.

As the information laid by Chief Williams reads, Mr. Shea is charged under section 72, which provides that all persons shall be liable to a fine of \$100 who are found guilty of selling without the license by law required.

Mr. Graydon contended at some length that his client has paid for his license "to sell liquor," and that he should be fined under section 86, which provides for a fine of \$20 on all persons found guilty of any infraction of the bylaws not already provided persons found guilty of any infraction of the bylaws not already provided

for.

Will Look Up Law.

The difficulty that Magistrate Judd finds himself in is that in a case similar to that of Mr. Shea heard in the common pleas divisional court in Toronto before Mr. Justice Teetzel some time ago, the defendant was found guilty under section 72, and fined \$100.

Mr. Graydon argued that the case did not apply to that of Mr. Shea.

Magistrate Judd, after listening to arguments for half an hour, finally decided to reserve his decision a week, and look up cases further, although he stated that his impression at the present time is that Mr. Shea is guilty under section 72. Will Look Up Law.

# UNIONIST INSURGENTS HAVE SURRENDERED

Balfour's Policy Adopted After Meeting of Faction Leaders.

London, Aug. 3.—The London Times says that Mr. Balfour's decision to move a vote of censure on the Government on the ground that Mr. Asquitt's advice to the King to create peers for the purpose of coercing the House of Lords, was come to after consultation with the leaders of the Unonist stalwarts, who opposed the official policy of their party as regulated by Mr. Balfour and Lord Lansdowne.

The paper hopes that the new plan may bring about a reunion of the two sections, and commends it as free from the objections attending the creation of peers, which the stalwart policy of resistance, if successful, would have necessitated. This is tantamount to suggesting that the impeachment of the Liberal Premier for treason may serve as an Opposition battle cry. [Canadian Press.]
