DEADLOCK OVER HIGHWAYS BILL

Premier Borden Refuses to Accept Amendments of the Senate.

Caurier Turns Tables on Premier When Latter Accuses Him of Intriguing.

Ottawa, March 28.-It looks tonight as though the two branches of Parliament had locked horns. The Government and the Provincial Cov-Senate, having amended the Government bill to grant aid to highways by providing, in accordance with the promises of the Government, that the grants made to the provinces shall be made upon the basis of population, and by expunging the clause giving the Minister of Railways authority on his own initiative to buld highways anywhere with the consent of the province in question, sent the amended measure back to the Commons for concurrence. When it was reached, shortly before 6 o'clock this afternoon, the Government, through Hon. Mr. Cochrane and Premier Borden, refused to accept the amendments in
