## ONT. HYDRO COMMISSION DECLARED A BIG FAILURE BY STATE INVESTIGATORS

New York Legislative Committee Appointed to Inquire Into State's Water Power Resources Advise Against the Adoption of Mr. Beck's System.

### "METHOD UNSUCCESSFUL, MEASURED BY ECONOMICAL AND BUSINESS STANDARDS'

Report Says That the Operations of Commission Are Conducted at a Loss of \$259,080 in Addition to Expenses of the Administration.

[Canadian Press.] Albany, N. Y., Jan. 15 .- The joint legislative committee appointed in 1911 to investigate the state's waterpower resources and recommend a possible plan for conservation and utilization reported today that "it would be impossible for the State of New York to develop a sufficient amount of hydraulic power to make any appreciable impression on the power de-

mands of the state." The committee have investigated the plan of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of the Province of Ontario, and they report that in their opinion "it is not a success measured by economic and business standards." They oppose the adoption of this plan by the state. STATE'S WATERPOWER.

The commission renew their recommendation made to the Legislature in 1912, and ask for the passage of legislation introduced at that time. They point out that there is within the state a daily consumption of over 2,000,000. horsepower and that to deliver this to the point of utilization would take over 8,000,000-water horse. power at the penstock.

They find that there is undeveloped within the state only 1,196,-800-horsepower, 262,700-horsepower of which is actually owned by the state, and 934,100-horsepower of which is claimed by private
