

FEWAL CHARGE WILL BE MADE AGAINST HANNA

Result of Inspector Snider's
Part in Canada Temperance
Campaigns.

C. M. BOWMAN THE ACCUSER

North Bruce to Demand Invest-
igation by Committee of
Legislature.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
Toronto, April 24.—Contrary to gen-
eral expectation, the Legislature did
not complete its business for proro-
gation today, and the House adjourned
at 6 o'clock this afternoon to set to-
gether again on Monday next.

The reason for this is that a formal
charge is to be laid in the House next
week connecting Hon. W. J. Hanna,
provincial secretary, with the partici-
pation of Provincial License Inspector
Snider in the recent campaigns under
the Canada Temperance Act in Huron,
Peel and Welland counties. The
charge will be made by C. M. Bowman,
member for North Bruce, on his re-
sponsibility as a member of the House
and he will demand an investigation
either by a select committee or the
committee on privileges and elections.
This, to some extent, will reproduce
the situation of a year ago when the
committee on privileges and elections
heard charges preferred by William
Fronz, of Central Huron, against the
provincial secretary in connection
with the taking of campaign contri-
butions from Government contractors.
The Snider episode has been more
or less on the order paper all session,
and only Wednesday morning by Mr.
Bowman asking for a select committee
was voted down. The significant
part of the debate was that both Hon.
J. J. Foy and Hon. B. J. Lang, who
came to the defense of the provincial se-
cretary, but it was voted down after a
brief discussion.

Financial Provisions Attacked.
After the second reading of the
supply bill, Mr. Bowman again raised
the question of the inadequacy of the
financial provisions made by the Govern-
ment for carrying on the public
services. Taking all the available
sources of revenue into consideration,
including the loans authorized, the
member for North Bruce said there
would be a deficit of between three
and three and one-half millions of
dollars at the end of the present fiscal
year if all the votes were cast as
estimates were completed. The situa-
tion was serious and if not remedied
would result in direct taxation. Mr.
Lucas charged Mr. Bowman with
pessimism, and declared the Govern-
ment would go on with its progressive
work feeling confident that the people
of the province would support any
measures necessary to raise the money
required.

The House spent most of the day in
oids and ends of legislation.

Dr. Seath's Attack.
It was the first day of the morning
sittings and Mr. Marshall (Monk) took
the lead in resenting with some show
of bitterness an attack recently made
upon him by Dr. John Seath, super-
intendent of education. It was an un-
pleasant surprise, for Dr. Seath, who
said, for a civil servant, to make an
attack upon a member of the House,
and for that purpose making use of
the files of the department. In giving
the attack, Dr. Seath's report made
by Dr. Seath himself upon his teach-
ing seventeen years ago, the superin-
tendent of education had not been
true or fair, for if he had consulted
reports made subsequent to his own
inspection by unbiased men he would
have found that his (Mr. Marshall's)
record was in keeping with that of
the other teachers in the province.

Dr. Pyne Blames the Supplier.
Dr. Pyne tried to pass the matter
over as being caused by a bad supplier,
but a subsequent motion by Dr. James
MacQueen (North Wentworth) to
protest against Dr. Seath's motion
presumption required the force of the
whole party majority to vote it down.
The Opposition went on record on
a motion calling upon the Government
for "Information and leadership in
dealing with the finances of the Uni-
versity of Toronto," which were de-
clared by the board of governors to
be in a serious condition. The motion
was submitted as an amendment to
the motion to go into supply and com-
pleted the main estimates for next
year.

**DEPOSITORS TO GET
BACK MONEY LOST**

Finance Minister Has Resolution to Help
Farmers' Bank Customers.

Ottawa, April 24.—The depositors of the
Farmers' Bank are to be paid the money
they lost through its failure. It is under-
stood that the shareholders will not be
reimbursed.

Finance Minister White has given notice
of a resolution making good the pledges
given by the government to the depositors
in the last campaign. The notice of the
minister declares "that it is expedient
to provide that there may be paid and
applied out of the consolidated revenue fund
of Canada a sum not exceeding \$1,200,000
to pay to persons who are creditors for
money on deposit in the Farmers' Bank of
Canada the respective amounts standing
at their credit on the books of the bank
when the bank suspended payment."

COWDRAY GETTING ANXIOUS

Answer Regarding Safety of Foreign-
ers in Mexico.

London, April 24.—A cabled appeal
from the American manager of the Te-
huantepec railway led Lord Cowdray to
visit the British foreign office and the
United States embassy today to request
protection for the foreign employees of
the line. Eighty per cent of the em-
ployees are American citizens, and, ac-
cording to the cablegram from the
manager, the Mexican authorities are
threatening them with arrest and for-
bidding them to depart from Mexico.
The embassy told him that the Anna-
polis and the Dever would be at Salina
Cruz on the Pacific side and that the
Nashville will arrive at Puerto, Mexico,
on the Atlantic side today.

SCHMIDT BLAMES ANOTHER

Now Says That He Did Not Kill Anna
Ammuller.

New York, April 24.—District Attorney
Whitman today received a letter from
Hans Schmidt, the former priest, await-
ing execution for the murder of Anna
Ammuller, in which Schmidt charges an-
other man with the crime. He declares
that the Ammuller girl died as the result
of a criminal operation performed by a
man whom he named. He admitted that
he had himself disposed of the body, and
also admitted that he had shamed in-
sanity during his trial. Mr. Whitman
said Schmidt also had written to Gov-
ernor Glynn begging that his sentence of
death be commuted to life imprisonment.
The district attorney, it is understood,
placed little credence in Schmidt's new
story.

CLUBS TO BE INSPECTED

Toronto, April 24.—Before the public
accounts committee today, Chief Inspector
Borrows, of the Toronto liquor license
commission, stated that there were no
instructions for the inspection of clubs
as there were for hotels and liquor shops.
As a result of this, a move will be made
to protect the clubs against fires by a
system of rigid inspection, the same as
hotels.

The ropes that are used in hotels, and
which are fastened to the bottom of the
windows will be placed over the window
at the top so that there will be some
chance of them being used in cases of
fire.
