MANY PEOPLE VIEW FAMOUS \$65,000 PICTURE

Many people have viewed the famous painting, "The Nativity of Christ," which is on display on the second floor of the Ontario Furniture Company's store. The picture was shown Friday morning for the first time, and since then it has excited considerable interest amongst Londoners and visitors to the city.

"The Nativity of Christ" was painted in Cairo, Egypt, 1887, by M. Jean Benjamin Constant, the figures being almost life size. The shepherds who were guided by the star to Bethlehem are entering the stable door.

The mother with the Babe in her arms sits on the straw in the middle foreground.

All the light in the little stable seems to shine forth from the Holy Child, and illuminates every object within its reach with a pale, soft light. Joseph kneels before the Mother and Babe, seeming awed at the sainted picture before him. Drowsy lambs and sheep are huddled in these soft shadows.

The turrets and round roofs of Bethlehem can be seen in the night through the open door. The picture is commanding and bears long acquaintance. Study its light and wonderful coloring before you go away from it.

It has been described by Meloson thus: "It is alive; there are no mistakes in it."

SPECIAL WAR SERVICES
Canon Tucker conducts Intercession at St. Paul's Cathedral.

BUY 27 HORSES
Sir Adam Beck, Major Leonard and Dr. C. S. Tamlin at Ingersoll and Woodstock Yesterday.

Sir Adam Beck, Major Wood Leonard, commanding officer, and Dr. C. S. Tamlin, veterinary officer, of the Sixth Field Battery, spent yesterday in Woodstock and Ingersoll, purchasing horses for war purposes. In all 27 animals were obtained at good prices, and are to be delivered at Queen's Park this morning.

The horses purchased yesterday are for general purposes, Sir Adam stated to The Advertiser last night, and gentlemen are rather heavier than those previously purchased for the use of the battery. They are all of splendid quality and passed a rigid veterinary test at the hands of Dr. Tamlin.

Tomorrow Sir Adam will be in Galt and Guelph. He says there is no particular limit to the number of horses he will buy; that as many as can be obtained will be needed.

ARMY HORSE INSPECTION.
An army horse inspection for the purchase of horses for use in the war will be held at the Union Stock Yards, West Toronto every day. Parties having horses to sell which will meet the requirements of the Imperial and Canadian officers who are in attendance daily, should communicate with the Union Stock Yards, immediately.

AN OPPORTUNITY FOR CANADIAN MANUFACTURERS

Gordon Philip Points Out New Fields Opened by European War.

GERMAN IMPORTS HEAVY
Last Year Canada Bought From Germany Goods Worth \$14,473,833.

FRENCH TRADE AFFECTED
Imports From Austria-Hungary Into Dominion Totalled \$1,827,943.

Industrial Commissioner Gordon Philip has prepared the following comprehensive article dealing with the imports into Canada of goods from those European countries affected by the war and pointing out the numerous opportunities offered to Canadian manufacturers to undertake the manufacture of these lines without handicap of keen European competition.

"This is a time of change in trade relationships. The shutting off of imports from continental Europe necessitates the establishing of new trade connections. The industries of Europe are generally speaking, at a standstill, and undoubtedly many will be worse before they can be better.

Extraordinary Opportunity Provided.
"While regretting, as all Canadians must regret, the onset of war in which Great Britain is involved, the extraordinary situation created provides opportunity for Canadian manufacturers to supply manufactured articles for the world's need.

"In addition to the unexploited opportunity for export business, figures to hand for the last customs fiscal year, issued by the department of trade and commerce at Ottawa, show the Dominion's home market for goods previously imported, to be an exceedingly rich and varied one.

During the fiscal year which closed March 31, 1914, Canada imported from Germany goods worth \$14,473,833, and from Austria-Hungary \$1,827,943.

European Competition Eliminated.
"Examination of these imported articles shows many lines which are already manufactured in Canada, and some of which have already put on new travelers in an effort to secure a share of them. There are, of course, numerous lines which, in spite of the heavy import duty, the cheap labor of European countries has precluded, in the past, the possibility of competition.

"The 'Nativity' is one of the world's greatest art treasures, and is not alone interesting to the art circles but enjoyable to all. The exhibition is entirely free.

Some examples taken from the Trade and Commerce report will be of interest at this time. Labels for cigar boxes, matchboxes, tin cans, meat tags, tickets and labels during last year to the value of \$35,250 were imported from Germany, paying a duty of 25 per cent. Paying the same rate of duty in the same year, German socks and stockings were imported to the value of \$29,507, of silk, \$15,923; of wool, \$55,192.

Big Field in China Goods.
"The import of Chinese porcelain, white granite and ironstone was imported from Germany during the year to the value of \$28,702; from France, \$130,410; and from Austria-Hungary, \$1,062. The duty on these articles is 2 1/2 per cent, and China clay, from which they are made, is imported from the United Kingdom and United States, and comes in free. Some fine China clay is procured in Austria-Hungary, and is not obtained from Germany.

The value of \$22,831 were imported from Germany last year, and another \$22,370 from Belgium. Glove leathers to the value of \$26,371, and leather goods to the value of \$26,371, were imported from Germany last year, paying a duty of 30 per cent. Germany last year exported to Canada clocks and time-recorders to the value of \$13,428.

Hungary supplies large quantities of collars and cuffs, paying a duty of 35 per cent, and amounted last year up to \$10,494. Glass carboys, bottles, flasks, jars and phials, paying the same duty, were imported from Germany in the past year to the value of \$58,072.

Glass Trades Affected.
"The glass trades will be largely affected by the war. Last year Canada imported from Belgium common window glass to the value of \$613,774, and cut, pressed and moulded tableware, paying a duty of 25 1/2 per cent was brought from Germany to the value of \$55,520. France \$29,269 and Belgium \$59,419; glass carboys, bottles, flasks, jars and phials, paying the same duty, were imported from Germany in the past year to the value of \$58,072.

water and steam pipes, as the German supply is absolutely stopped. Last year Canada imported from that country pipes and tubing, plain and galvanized, to the value of \$237,044, on which the duty is 30 per cent. Germany also supplied Canada last year with \$239,699 of boiler tubes and flues, which enter Canada free. Both Austria-Hungary and Germany supplied Canada last year with agate, granite and enamelware, the former to the value of \$20,029, and the latter \$49,966, paying a duty of 35 per cent. Germany also supplied hollow-ware to the value of \$32,728, on which a duty of 30 per cent is paid, and to the value of \$86,065, and \$14,298 was the value of gas, oil and electric light fixtures, of metal, imported, paying a duty of 30 per cent. The following figures on lamps, gas and electric light fixtures, and handholders of metal, paying a duty of 30 per cent, are also of interest: Austria-Hungary, \$18,050; Belgium, \$25,432; Germany, \$14,009. Other articles imported from Germany last year were as follows: pianos, \$11,560; piano parts, \$12,485; optical and scientific instruments, \$59,532; wall-paper, \$17,585; sensitized photographic paper, \$14,967; ruled, bordered and coated paper, \$23,678.

Lead Pencils From Germany.
"Lead pencils come in large quantities from Germany every year, paying a duty of \$12,375 on 112 Canada. Imported lead pencils to the value of \$62,048; 1913, \$74,747; 1914, \$78,522.

"France's exports to Canada of perfume, toilet and cosmetic preparations, are largely affected by the war. The former last year amounted to \$212,030, and the latter \$483,431. France also supplied Canada last year with purses, card cases and musical instrument cases, and Germany supplied \$94,588 worth of the same goods.

Carpet and Wool Manufacturers.
Manufactures of wool used in the Dominion are imported largely from European countries. Germany's contribution to the following last year: Mats and rugs, \$30,699; whole carpets, Oriental and other designs, \$20,812; cashmeres, \$51,522; rug-made carpets, \$137,435, not including women and children's outdoor garments, amounted in value to \$101,299; fabrics, \$205,341; felt, \$66,535; knitted goods, \$89,584; socks and stockings, \$55,429; and tweeds, \$2,587.

"France's exports to Canada of woollen goods last year were chiefly: cassimeres, \$112,324; ready-made clothing, \$26,721; fabrics, \$29,604; flannels, \$19,453. Belgium also contributed \$13,428 in woollen coatings and overcoats, and \$12,343 in ready-made clothing. Woollen goods is generally 35 per cent. Another article of wool supplied in large quantities is pressed felt, on which the duty is 25 per cent. Of the Austria-Hungary supplied \$50,520, and Germany \$68,535 last year.
