OMAHA, Neb., Nov. 10.-Bancroft B. Johnson, president of the American League, left for home tonight, after the National Association of professional baseball leagues, now in session here, had given assurance that it would continue to give hearty support to organized baseball.

The American League executive declined to discuss the probability of opening the arms of organized baseball to receive the Federal League, but concerning the general situation, he said

We are now in a satisfactory working position. I shall meet Charles Weeghman in Chicago on Thursday and discuss the probable change in ownership of the Chicago National League Club. Later there will be a conference between members of the National Commission and leading officials of the minor leagues which we expect will result in again placing organized baseball on a sound


