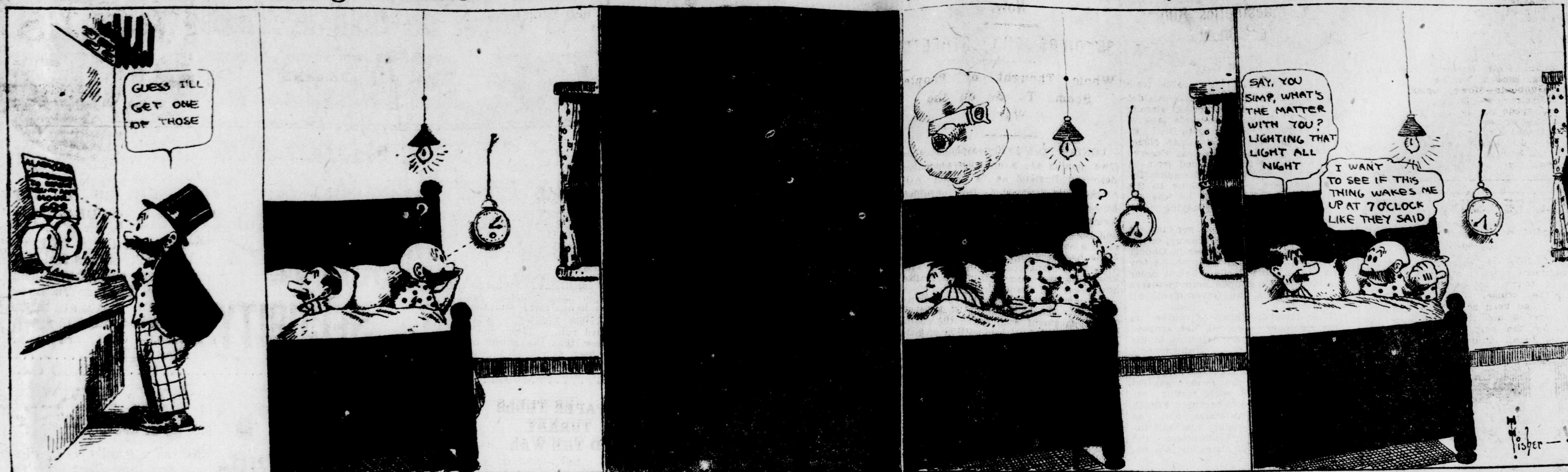

OCCIDENT CLUB BEAT THE LONDON HOUSE

West-Enders Were 107 Pins Too Good.

ROGERS WAS HIGH MAN

Some Good Scores Made in Last Night's City Bowling League Game.

The Occident Club defeated the London House team in a City Bowling League match on the National alley last evening, by 107 pins. The Occident bowled a strong game, although the London House beat them by 54 pins in the second match, and had a lead of 5 pins to start the third and last match with. 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CANADIAN LEAGUE ASKS PERMISSION TO CLOSE ITS BALL PARKS DURING 1915

President Fitzgerald, on Behalf of Club Owners, Asks National Association's Consent To Hold the Franchises For Year Without Playing.

WESTERN CANADA LEAGUE ALSO DESIRES TO CLOSE UP ITS BALL PARKS NEXT YEAR

Unsettled Condition of the Country, Owing to the European War, Would Make Baseball a Poor Paying Proposition Next Season.

OMAHA, Neb., Nov. 10.—Bancroft B. Johnson, president of the American League, left for home tonight, after the National Association of professional baseball leagues, now in session here, had given assurance that it would continue to give hearty support to organized baseball.

The American League executive declined to discuss the probability of opening the arms of organized baseball to receive the Federal League, but concerning the general situation, he said:

"We are now in a satisfactory working position. I shall meet Charles Weeghman in Chicago on Thursday and discuss the probable change in ownership of the Chicago National League Club. Later there will be a conference between members of the National Commission and leading officials of the minor leagues which we expect will result in again placing organized baseball on a sound footing."

BROOKLYN NOT TO CHANGE HANDS.

Charles Ebbets, president of the Brooklyn National League Club, made it plain that the control of that organization was not to change hands. "I shall remain in baseball as long as my health permits," he declared. "There has been no option given on the Brooklyn club and I would not sell my interests for a million dollars."

Today's session of the minor league organization, with the exception of the adoption of the resolution pledging adherence to organized ball, were routine in character.

The Canadian Northwest League and the Canadian League have asked for permission to close their parks during 1915 on account of the European war, and the general sentiment was in favor of granting their requests. The matter will be decided tomorrow.

San Francisco has been agreed upon for next year's convention.

NEWS NOT SURPRISING.

The news that the Canadian League club owners may close up their parks next season does not come as a surprise to those who have been in touch with the organization lately. Owing to the European war and the present condition of the league, there is little chance of any of the clubs making baseball pay next summer in this country. It would pay the franchise holders to close up for a season and start a new circuit the following year providing the war was over. Until the European war is ended it is doubtful if there will be very much interest in baseball in Canada.

The Canadian League has not yet definitely decided to close up its parks next season. President Fitzgerald is at Omaha at present merely to get the National Association's permission to hold the territory for a season in case such an arrangement is reached by the club owners. It is not likely that any real decision in the matter will be made until the Canadian League holds its annual meeting in Toronto in December.

WELSH-WHITE BOUT RECEIPTS WERE \$24,000

The champion, who was held to a draw, was nursing a discolored eye as a result of an old wound opened by White in the tenth round. The Chicagoans were unmarked.

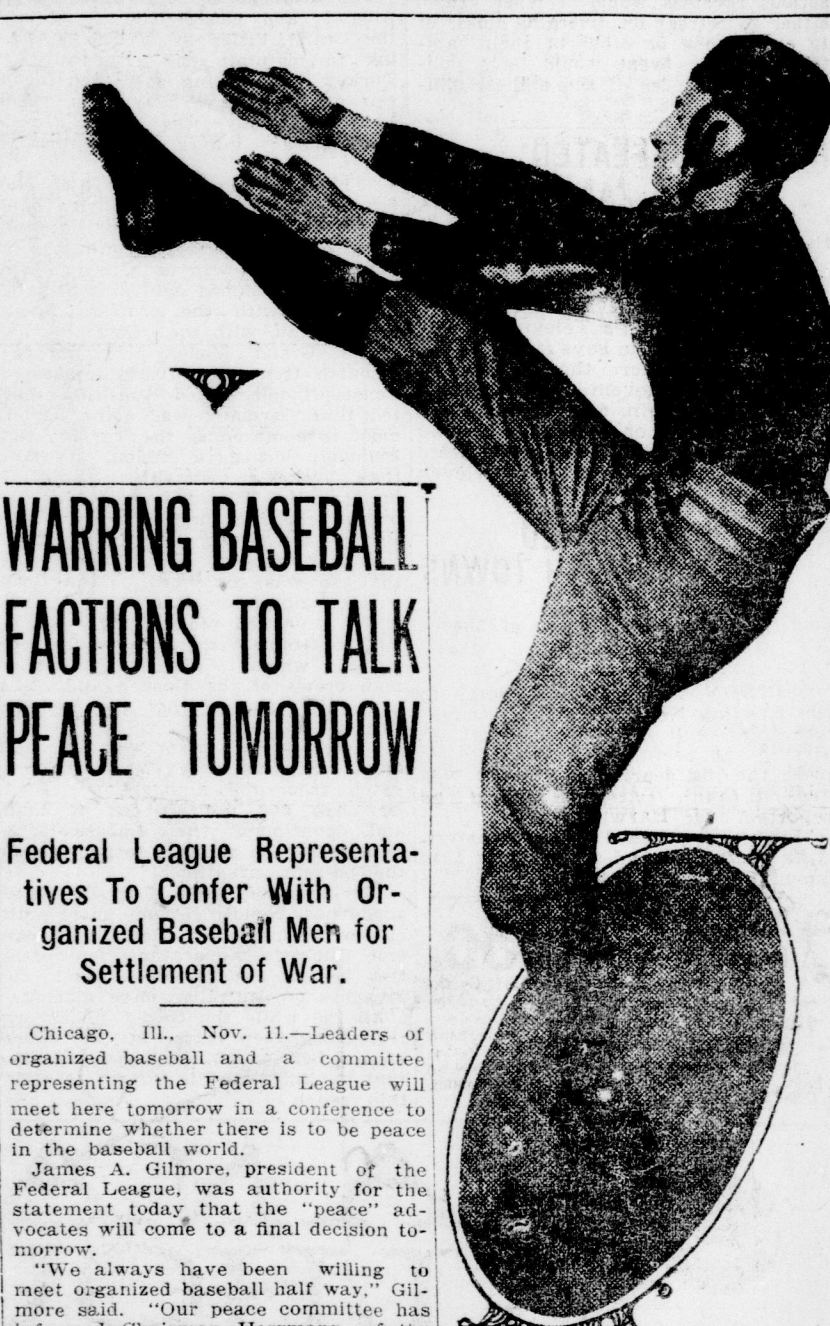
WELSH WILL MEET DUFFY AT BUFFALO NOVEMBER 19

LONDON AND HAMILTON CLUBS ARE NOT IN FAVOR OF CLOSING

Presidents Stevely and Garthwaite Declare War Will Have Little Effect On Baseball Next Summer—Merely a Safety Measure.

The London and Hamilton Canadian League clubs do not intend to close their ball parks next season. President Stevely, of the London club, declared today that he, for one, was not in favor of closing up next season on account of the war. Mr. Stevely had no sooner made this declaration when the telephone rang. President Garthwaite, of the Hamilton club, was on the other end of the wire, and he emphatically stated that the Hamilton club would not close its park next season. Mr. Stevely has not yet called the same, but there is no doubt that he feels the same way about it.

Merely Precautionary. In asking the National Association permission to retain its standing for a year without playing next season, the Canadian League is merely taking a precautionary measure. It may happen that conditions will be such that the league will be forced to close its parks next season, and the getting this concession now, future difficulties will be removed. President Fitzgerald has no instructions from the club owners to take such a course, but he is doing this just to be on the safe side.

"The people will have to have some form of amusement, no matter what happens," said President Stevely this morning, "and baseball will be just as popular as any. I don't think the war will affect the league in any extent, if at all."

President Garthwaite expresses the same opinion as President Stevely. The Hamilton club is looking forward to one of the best seasons it has ever experienced next year.
