GOOTSON ARBITRATION

RESUMES ON TUESDAY

Junk Dealer's Claim Against Railway Commission Up Again.

The special court of arbitration in the action of Maurice Gootson against the London Railway Commission to recover the value of land expropriated by the London and Port Stanley Railway commission for its new car barns and shops, commenced again at the court house on Tuesday. In view of the claims of Gootson and the fact that the city, through the railway commission, is directly interested in the case considerable interest attaches.

The arbitrators are being called on to fix a value for the expropriated property. Gootson's previous evidence has been to the effect that his business as a junk dealer has materially lessened since he was forced from his yards that were taken by the railway.

At the last hearing, T. G. Meredith, K. C., demanded time to go over the books of the Gootson firm. This was granted by the three arbitrators, Judge Barron of Stratford, Judge Talbot Macbeth and Ed. Meredith, K. C.

WEDS MONTREAL GIRL

Former London Boy in Flying Corps

Figures in War Romance, Too.

The marriage of Flight-Lieut. Alfred G. Dann, R. F. C., to Miss Beryl Penwick of Montreal, Que., was solemnized on Sunday, June 11, in the Church of England, Bolton, Lancashire. Flight-Lieut. Dann, who is the second son of the late Rev. Precentor Dann of St. Paul's Cathedral, this city, is at present on furlough from the front where he has been for the past year and a half. The wedding took place from the residence of the groom's brother, Lieut.-Col. R. H. Dann, who is at home recovering from wounds received during the recent Ypres fighting.

Flight-Lieut. Dann was for some years with the Bank of British North America in London, being manager of the market branch of the bank, and has numerous friends in the city.

Lieut. and Mrs. Dann are at present spending their honeymoon in Ireland.

Lieut. Dann, 72nd (Scottish) Highlanders, C. E. F., brother of the groom, was also present at the ceremony.

WOUNDED PIONEER'S

MOTHER LIVES HERE

Major McMorris Enlisted in West and Went With Reorganized Unit.

Major Stewart P. McMorris, whose name appears among the wounded in last week's casualty list, is a son of Mrs. R. McMorris of 785 Hellmuth avenue, city.

Major McMorris, who formerly belonged to the Earl Grey Rifles of Prince Rupert, received his appointment to the 4th Battalion of Victoria, B. C., and left Victoria for England a year ago last May.

In the early part of January his battalion was reorganized as a Pioneer Battalion and left for active services shortly after.

As the duties of a pioneer battalion include building and repairing trenches, building bridges, mining and sapping, the frequent exposure to the fire of the enemy in open spaces, and without time or opportunity to return the fire, it is not surprising how many casualties there have been in the battalion.

Major McMorris was formerly a member of the firm of Baxie, McMorris, railway contractors and bridge builders, Niagara Falls, Ont. He is a native of Huron County, and a graduate of Toronto University.

TO 70TH IN ENGLAND

TELLS OF LONDONERS

Pte. "Bill" Sharman, Another Former Advertiser Reporter Witnessed Them Overseas.

Pte. "Bill" Sharman, Another Former Reporter, Going Blind.

News of Londoners in England is given in a letter received today from Pte. W. N. Minihinnick, a former member of No. 3 Stationary Hospital, who was until his enlistment a member of the editorial staff of The Advertiser, and who is now serving with the Duchess of Connaught Canadian Red Cross Hospital at Clivedon.

Of Pte. William Sharman, at one time a London reporter and later in the car department of the Grand Trunk here he says:

"The other night in Folkestone I saw a familiar face in a doorway. It was Bill Sharman's. Bill is gradually growing blind in his left eye and one of his shoulders is shot to pieces with shrapnel. He was through the mill in Flanders and 'got' it at Clivedon."

Pte. Sharman enlisted with the Nova Scotia Highlanders' draft that was recruited in London and served at the front with the 16th Canadian Scottish Battalion.

Of Eric Ross Golding, globe trotter, poet and soldier, whose poems appeared many times before and even after the declaration of war, he says:

"There is a patient here from 'K' company of the R. C. R. who knows Eric. Eric's company was nearly wiped out not long ago, so if he is still alive he is one of the lucky ones."

"A Londoner, named Thomas Page of the 2nd Pioneers, and who lived on Clark street, died in my ward here a couple of weeks ago from heart failure that resulted from bad shrapnel wounds."

"Another Londoner, Lance-Corp. Charles Burns, who lives on Craig street, is here now. He is nearly blind."

An interesting sidelight in Pte. Minihinnick's letter is: "I was at a movie show in Maidenhead the other night. All of a sudden the orchestra played 'The Maple Leaf' and the screen showed the 70th Battalion being presented with colors in Victoria Park."

"I suppose that the Canucks will be up again in the near future, as I just read that Fritz broke through the line at St. Eloi. The patients say it is hell there, and if a general advance is ever made the Canadians near it will be up against an awful grilling."

This prediction has been since amply borne out by the casualty lists that have been appearing for the last two weeks.

WATCHMAN ARRESTED BOARD EXPRESSES

FOR MANSLAUGHTER HAS A GOOD RECORD

Never Had an Accident in Nine Years' Service.

REMANDED IN COURT

Will Appear on Tuesday for Hearing Before Magistrate Judd.

W. J. Premo, of 26 Wreay street, watchman at the Talbot street crossing of the Grand Trunk, was placed under arrest last night on a charge of manslaughter in connection with the collision Sunday, which cost Capt. Jack Case his life.

Premo appeared in the police court today before Magistrate J. C. Judd, and was remanded until Tuesday, June 27, for a hearing, both Crown Attorney J. R. McKillop and P. H. Bartlett, who is appearing for Premo, stating that they were not prepared to proceed with the case.

Premo was allowed out on \$1,000 bail, which he himself gave, and a surety of \$500 each. In court today, he said that he had lived in the city for 35 years, and was confident that he would be found not guilty of the charge. Premo is 59 years of age, and has a splendid record with the company.

He suffered terribly from shock after yesterday's accident, but continued on duty. Early in the evening detectives were detailed to take him in custody.

Superintendent Davidson, of the G. T. R., is conducting a complete investigation into the fatality.

Last night he took the evidence of W. J. Premo, the crossing watchman, and the crew to extra E629, the freight train which crashed into the truck. Today the evidence of the crew of extra west 684, the train which had just cleared the crossing when the accident occurred, was taken.

Has Good Record. Mr. Davidson stated to The Advertiser that he has absolutely no complaint to make on the matter beyond the fact that Crossing Watchman Premo had been nine years at the Talbot street crossing, and had never had an accident. He was regarded as a most careful and trustworthy employee, Mr. Davidson says.

The official statement is to the effect that at 10:50 Sunday morning freight extra west 684, comprising 60 cars, was pulling out, when the fire department came southward.

Watchman Premo looked on the opposite track to see if a train was coming from the west, and saw none. Capt. Aitken and the motor truck went for train 684 to pass. As soon as the caboose of 684 was clear Premo raised the gates. Capt. Aitken's car cleared the tracks, but as soon as the motor truck ran onto the centre track it was struck by No. 629. It was shoved ahead of the locomotive for over three car-lengths. Engineer Woodcock of Sarnia, who was at the throttle, says he was going about six miles an hour. He did not know of the accident until his train was stopped. He was at once applied the emergency brakes. The train was in charge of Conductor J. Boeche, of Sarnia. The caboose of No. 684 was 59 feet west of the crossing when the fire apparatus started across.

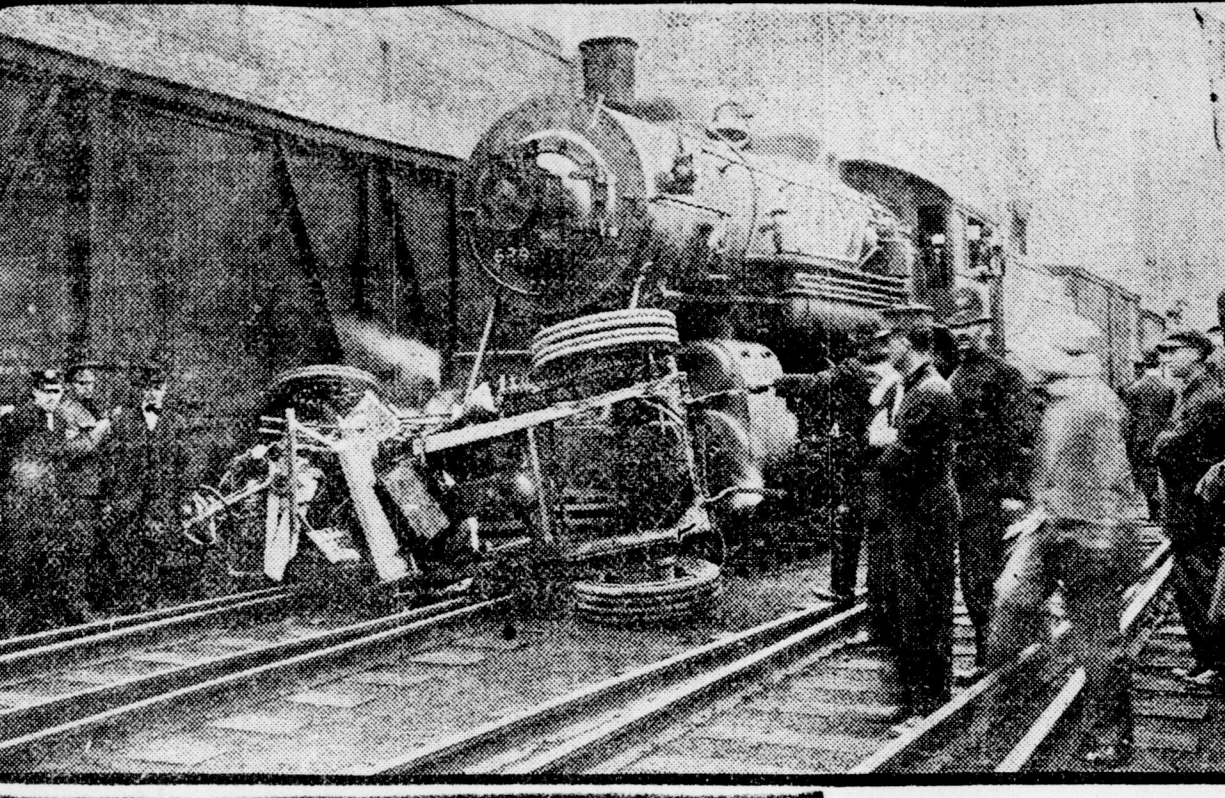
SARNIA MAN WOUNDED, IS QUITE WELL KNOWN

In a letter received here by Mrs. Allingham, who has a son at the front, the information is contained that Pte. Neil Benware, the Courtwright man, who was recently killed in action, was hit by two fragments of a shrapnel shell and died a few hours later. He gives the location of the grave as the Sarnia Military Cemetery, grave plot No. 7, A17.
