Blackheads.

Hello, Miss Grey! Here I am to bother you again. Please tell me how I can get rid of horrid blackheads. My sister has red hair and steel-blue eyes. What colors should she wear? Ans.—Here is a remedy for blackheads recommended by Dr. Brady: Each evening bathe the face for five minutes with very hot water and soap, rinse several times with tepid water, and then gently express the blackheads by pressure with the fingers covered with a soft towel. Follow this with an application of this lotion, which should dry and remain on the skin over night.

Sublimed sulphur. Alcohol. Compound tincture of lavender. Glycerine. Camphor water. Of equal parts to make four ounces. Inexperienced druggists often tell patrons this formula is incorrect, because the sulphur does not dissolve in camphor water. It is soluble, and only a mixture is intended, which must be shaken before it is used.

Your sister could wear any shade of blue and water and drain. Boil together one and half pints of vinegar, one and half pints of brown sugar. Mix with a little vinegar half a cup of mustard, half a cup of flour, one tablespoon turmeric powder, stir into boiling vinegar. Cook five minutes, add beans, and bring to a boil.

Devil's Food Cake. Melt one cup grated chocolate in half-cup of milk; let cool. Cream half-cup butter and two cups brown sugar, and well-beaten yolks of three eggs. Then add chocolate to a little vinegar half a cup of flour, one tablespoon turmeric powder, stir into boiling vinegar. Cook five minutes, add beans, and bring to a boil.

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Things Worth Knowing About House Fly Evil

House flies are known to be highly menacing to the human race as carriers of disease germs. Decaying vegetable and animal matter, particularly manures, are the common breeding grounds for these dangerous pests. One fly will lay 150 eggs in each of two to four batches. These eggs hatch in 24 hours. In twelve days adult flies are ready to carry reproduction, as many as ten to twelve generations coming into being before the summer ends. The millions possible, therefore, are all equipped to carry on the nefarious business of germ distribution.

Preventive measures are highly important in combating the fly. Cleanliness is the greatest. Spraying manure heaps and refuse piles with formalin solution, two teaspoonfuls of commercial formalin to a pint of water, will keep down some of the multiplications of generations, and flypaper, the same solution as above, sweetened with sugar and placed in saucers, will kill those that get into the house.
