PROPOSES WAR ON PROFITEERS

Drury Admits Cabinet Has Already Selected Provincial Fuel Controller.

States Appointment Will Be Announced in Course of Few Days.

TORONTO, Aug. 8.—At today's session of the Ontario cabinet the problem of selecting a fuel controller was debated, also the scope of his duties, and jurisdiction in the matter of preventing profiteering.

Following the meeting Premier Drury announced that while several names had been submitted for the office, the cabinet had practically decided upon a certain individual who, though not a coal dealer or directly connected with the business, appears to be well qualified for the position. The identity of the prospective controller, the premier said, would not be divulged until he has consented to act.

The premier stated that it was altogether probable that the appointment would be made in the course of a few days. He was anxious that the position should be filled in time to enable a new fuel administrator to attend the joint conference of the government and the wholesale and retail coal dealers from all over the province, which will be held on Friday afternoon in the premier's office.

The premier did not believe the coal dealers would take advantage of the scarcity of coal to obtain high prices.

He emphasized that the fuel controller would be empowered to act should there be any attempt at profiteering. The controller would have access to the figures relating to prices paid by the dealers. There were channels through which a speedy ending would be put to profiteers, but he did not think that it would be necessary for the cabinet or the fuel administrator to resort to drastic measures.

KITCHENER MAN STRUCK BY CAR

Henry F. Jacobi Suffering From Fractured Skull in K. W. Hospital.

Special to London Advertiser. KITCHENER, Aug. 8.—Henry F. Jacobi, aged about 58, a contracting carpenter of Waterloo, lies dangerously ill at the Kitchener-Waterloo Hospital as a result of being hit while crossing King street on a bicycle at the Union street intersection late yesterday.

A motor car, which was alleged to have been speeding at the time, swerved suddenly from the right to the left side of the street, and crashed into Jacobi's wheel, throwing him into the air. He landed several feet away, striking on his head. He regained consciousness today at the hospital, where it has been found he is suffering from a fracture of the skull, a broken shoulder and three broken ribs.

Hope is held out for his recovery. There were four men in the car, all of whom have disappeared. The car came to grief against the curb, and is now in the hands of the Waterloo police. A hat found in the car indicates that one of the occupants is from Brantford.

PETROLEA MAN CLAIMS FARMING DOES NOT PAY

States Average Income of Agriculturists in 1920 Was Only \$219.

Special to London Advertiser. SARNIA, Aug. 8.—W. P. McDonald, Petrolea district agricultural representative, was the speaker today at the weekly luncheon of the Sarnia Chamber of Commerce, his subject being the relationship between urban and rural municipalities.

Outstanding statements made by the speaker were: First, that farming was not a paying investment, and second, that the farmers' political movement was not a class movement, but was rather based on the "live and let live plan."

Mr. McDonald quoted statistics to show that the average farmer's income for a number of years was as follows: 1914, \$454; 1915, \$484; 1916, \$543; 1917, \$705; 1918, \$826; 1919, \$836; 1920, \$219. The "Kazoo" trio of Port Huron rendered several selections, and aided the community singing.

HEAVY WIND AT SPARTA LEVELS FIELDS OF CORN

Special to London Advertiser. SPARTA, Aug. 8.—This vicinity was visited yesterday afternoon by the heaviest rainstorm of the season. The rain came down in torrents, and for a time was accompanied with a strong northwest wind, which snapped off quite a number of trees, scattered shingles off many roofs, and did considerable damage to corn. In some cases the corn was broken off at the joints, or torn out by the roots. No buildings were destroyed.

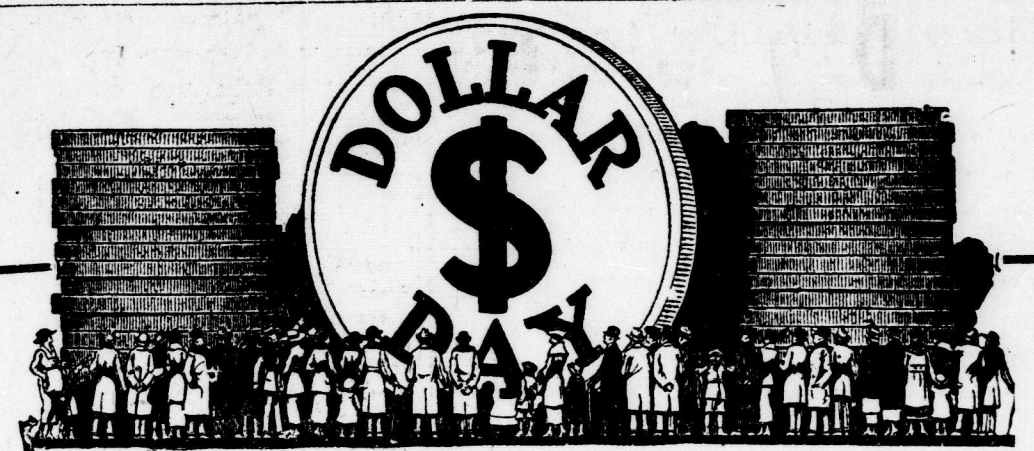

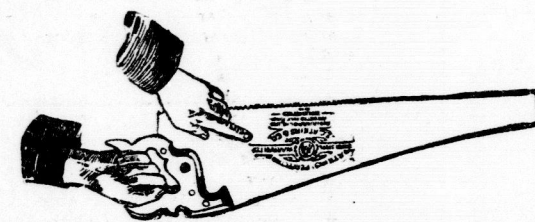
