

RIOT GREETS OTTAWAS' 2-0 WIN AT MONTREAL

Lou Marsh, Center of Storm of Missiles, Including Bottles.

GAME WAS POOR ONE

Couture Leads Canadien Revenge-Seekers With Attack on Denenny.

Montreal, March 7.—Ottawa Senators took a two-goal lead in the play-off series for the championship of the National Hockey League when they defeated Canadiens at the Mount Royal Arena here tonight 2 to 0.

The game ended in a riot when a spectator, starting to beat up Lou Marsh as he came off the ice, struck him on the face. The referee hit back before the police rescued him, and the Ottawa players were escorted to their respective dressing rooms. The crowd rushed the ice, and minor fights started. Reserve police officers came in, and after ten minutes affairs quieted down. Attempts to stop the mix-ups by striking up the National Anthem proved futile, and the incipient riot died of its own accord.

The game itself was a poor display from the belated start to the final. Little good hockey was in evidence, and the apparent desire of the Canadiens to mix matters with the Senators led to a most disappointing match. Couture was the worst offender, getting a major foul for deliberately striking Denemy over the head just after the latter had tallied the first goal.

Lou Marsh came in for considerable criticism from the Canadien supporters, two bottles, among other missiles, being directed at the official from spectators in the rush seats. The game twice had to be called while the ice was cleared of debris.

This happened in the opening period, when Cooper Smeaton had to address the crowd, announcing that the game would be called if any more stuff was thrown on the ice. The announcement appeared to have seen announcement appeared to have some effect on the 6,000 odd fans who jammed the rink. However, they followed the play all through the match with an intensity of feeling.
