DOUKHOBORS PLAN LIBERALS' CHOICE

Fifteen Hundred Settlers Propose To Leave Saskatch-

CLIMATE TOO SEVERE

Canadian Press Despatch.
Winnipeg, June 18.—Fifteen hundred Doukhobors now living in Sasatchewan are planning to leave that province and take up land in Ontario. according to an announcement made here last night by Peter Verigin, leader of the sect.

Mr. Verigin expects to leave for the east in a day or two to prospect a suitable area in which to locate his followers. a suitable area in which to locate his followers.

Mr. Verigin explained that the Doukhobors are finding the climate of Saskatchewan too severe in the winter. He pointed out that while it might suit persons who eat meat, it is not so suited to those who practise vegetarianism, a diet system which is part of the creed of the Doukhobors.

Doukhobors.

The Doukhobors planned to buy between 10,000 and 20,000 acres suitable for small and large fruit growing in the Niagara peninsula. Their holdings in Saskatchewan are esti-mated to be 40,000 acres in the districts of Verigin and Kylemore.

The aid of the Dominion govern-

ment will be requested in giving ad-vice and protection in obtaining suitable lands, and financial assistance will be asked. The government also will be asked to do what it can to bring about a sale of lands in Sasbring about a sale of lands in Sas-katchewan, and to recommend in-coming groups of immigrants to take up the community's lands. 
LEACOCK IS UNABLE TO SPEAK IN LONDON
