## DOCKHOBORS PLAN TO START FARMING LAND IN ONTARIO

Fifteen Hundred Settlers Propose To Leave Saskatchewan.

## CLIMATE TOO SEVERE

Winnipeg, June 18.—Fifteen hundred Doukhobors now living in Saskatchewan are planning to leave that province and take up land in Ontario, according to an announcement made here last night by Peter Verigin, leader of the sect.

Mr. Verigin expects to leave for the east in a day or two to prospect a suitable area in which to locate his followers.

Mr. Verigin explained that the Doukhobors are finding the climate of Saskatchewan too severe in the winter. He pointed out that while it might suit persons who eat meat, it is not so for those who are vegetarians, a diet system which is part of the creed of the Doukhobors.

The Doukhobors planned to buy between 10,000 and 20,000 acres suitable for small and large fruit growing in the Niagara peninsula. Their holdings in Saskatchewan are estimated to be 40,000 acres in the districts of Verigin and Kilmore.

The aid of the Dominion government will be requested in giving advice and protection in obtaining suitable lands, and financial assistance will be asked. The government also will be asked to what it can bring about a sale of lands in Saskatchewan, and to recommend incoming groups of immigrants to take up the community's lands. These are to be released gradually, for when the movement is commenced next spring it is to be done by gradual process dependent upon securing the lands in Ontario and working off the relinquished lands in Saskatchewan.

The migration would ultimately extend to Doukhobors in the Crow's Nest Pass in Alberta, numbering about 1,000, but the settlement in British Columbia does not propose moving.

If the migration is carried out, the sect will start a jam-making industry in Ontario, somewhat similar to that now operated at Brilliant, B.C.

## CIVIC YEAR BOOK OUT, CONTAINS PAY LISTS

Wenige-Beck Pay Controversy Officially Ends Today.

The Wenige-Beck pay list controversy terminated this morning, when City Clerk Sam Baker placed on sale the first 100 copies of the 1923 municipal year book.

Ordinarily published in February, this official yearly review of London's activities has just come from the printers, the long delay occasioned by the refusal of the public utilities commissioners, Sir Adam Beck and his supporters on the Port Stanley Commission declining to submit their pay lists for incorporation therein.

The books are now on sale at 50 cents per copy, and contain in addition to a general information as to former years, a complete wage and salary list of all city employees and officials. None are missing, the authorities assure.

## REPORTS COST OF FOOD INCREASED IN U. S. CITIES

Washington, June 18.—The retail cost of food to the average family in 51 cities of the United States increased twenty-tenths of one per cent from April 15 to May 15, according to figures announced today by the bureau of labor statistics of the department of labor. Of 32 cities showing an increase, the highest, 4 per cent, was recorded in Philadelphia.

The average increase of the year, ending May 15, was 3 per cent.
