

four gentlemen who have come from England for the purpose of going up to the Yukon country for the preliminary development work of the British Yukon Co. who have just had their charter passed by the Dominion parliament. This party is composed of Messrs. J. H. Escolme, managing director of the com pany; Arthur Bellingham, mining and civil engineer; R. Hill, an experienced sawmill operator and lumberman; and H. F. Holmes. Mr. Escolme says that the intention is at present to go to Sequimish bay, in Alaska, where sawmills and a general depot will be established and then trading posts will be opened on the line through the White Pass into the Yukon. The White Pass, Mr. Escolme feels assured, is the most practicable key to the Yukon. The intention is to run steamers to the foot of the pass to connect with 35 miles of railway which will reach the lakes whence steamers will again be ased. The road over the pass is already being slashed out and other preliminary work is being done; Mr. Escolme will conis being done; Mr. Escolme will continue these operations, look over the country and see just what its opportuni-

"The company's intentions are to do a general trading and transportation business," said Mr. Escolme, "and as the travel into the Yukon is very large and constantly increasing, we expect it to be remunerative. We have, of course. mining also, but no special powers that any other corporation could not get."

The party will remain in town for a few days before proceeding north.
