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16-Sir Thomas Lip-
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Storm Sweeps New York City

Church Spires Loosened And
Havoc Wrought Along
Waterfront.

Passengers' Fearful Experience
in Hurricane on the At-
lantic Coast.

New York, Sept. 16.-Greater New
York and vicinity were visited today by
the fiercest wind and rain storm in
years. The day began with rain, which
increased as the east wind grew stronger
and for two hours about midday the
fury of the elements amounted to many
thousands of dollars. The gale cul-
minated at noon in wind velocity of 54
miles an hour. The gauges at the
weather bureau registered 1.2 inches
precipitation in two hours. By the mid-
dle of the afternoon the wind had sub-
sided and the sun appeared. Several
persons were injured by being blown
off fire escapes, and by being forced
against walls by the onslaught of the
storm, but no deaths have been reported.
The gale was especially severe at sea,
causing harm to shipping down the bay,
where many boats were wrecked. The
worst damage was reported from Staten Island, where the
sloop fleet of the Staten Island Yacht
Club was sunk or wrecked. The pilot
boat Hermit was driven ashore and
there was a collision between a schooner
and a barge. A hurricane force cyclonic
force on the center of the city loo-
sening the 250 foot spire of St. Bar-
tholomew's Church, which was blown
up and umbrellas of pedestrians were
wrecked. Telegraph and telephone wires
above ground were broken in all parts of
the metropolitan district.

The storm in the upper bay was the
most experienced left Nelson this morning
from 10 a. m. till 12:30 p. m. the wind blew
with terrific force, attaining a velocity of
nearly 60 miles an hour. At the same
time force squalls raised a mountainous
sea, and many small boats were wrecked
and wharves along Staten Island
were broken in all parts of the
metropolitan district.

The passengers on the White Star
liner Oceanic from Queenstown which
arrived late today had a very disagree-
able voyage as far as weather was con-
cerned. On leaving Queenstown a ter-
rible southeast gale prevailed and the
steamer was obliged to bring her har-
bor pilot, John Whalen, to this city.
She was unable to land him before leaving
the Irish coast.

Gales and fog with very high seas
lasted through several days. The ship
land was sighted at 12:30 this afternoon
with a tremendous gale blowing.
The liner Oceanic had not been reported
southward in order to ride out the gale.
As the storm subsided the Oceanic was
seen on her course and made port in
safety. The liner was reported to have
arrived at Liverpool, was starting out
of port as the Oceanic neared Sandy Hook.

The ship was plunging in the sea
and seemed to sweep half way up her
funnel.

The Old Dominion liner Princess
Anne, Capt. Capley, from New York to
Norfolk with a passenger list of 100
sailed slowly in the afternoon. The ship
told tonight with her cargo badly list-
ed. The full strength of the storm was
felt behind her scheduled time.

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POLITICS BY WIRE

Rossland Agent Uses Associated Press
to Read Mr. Martin a Lecture.

Rossland, B. C., Sept. 16.-Consider-
able interest having been manifested in
the statements publicly made by James
Macdonald, Liberal member for the
Rossland city electoral division, with
reference to the Liberal leadership and
his attitude on Joseph Martin's alleged
designs on the position, the following
resume of Mr. Macdonald's remarks
thereon will be received with interest.

After discussing other issues, Mr. Mac-
donald said the Liberals had been ac-
cused of going to the country without a
leader. Their opponents predicted if
the Liberals were successful the country
would have a cabinet of reactionaries.
Martin seemed to be a great bugbear
to the Conservatives, and it was only
fair that he should state his position
on the subject. After considering the
question carefully, he had concluded Mr.
Joseph Martin was not the man to lead
the Liberal party in British Columbia.
He said this in all kindness to Mr.
Martin, nor did he believe Mr. Martin
was all that had been painted by his
opponents. A former Rossland agent
was an excellent example of a cabinet
leader and a political opponent of Mr.
Martin's for years, had said in the
House of Commons that Mr. Martin was
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
