while others refused to pay at all. Among the latter were several anglers from Campbellton. The Quebec Government then instructed its legal attorneys to institute proceedings to collect the fine.

John Hall Kelly, M. L. A., of New Carlisle, took up the defense of the parties sued, and in answer to the Government's action set up two distinct issues; the first was that the law passed by the Quebec Legislature was not constitutional, being 'ultra vires' of the rights of the Provincial parliament and wholly within the jurisdiction of the Federal Government.

The second point was that, even admitting that the law was constitutional, that it did not apply to individuals who fished on private water in the province. In the fifteen cases it happened that the anglers had all fished on private water, which they owned in fee simple or which they had leased from the owners thereof.

In rendering judgment Judge Tessier decided the cases as regards the law, on the second point, raised and declared that the law did not apply to parties fishing their own or leased water.

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FISHERMEN WIN FISHERY CASES

Quebec Government Lose in Every Case and N. B. Residents Win.

WAS 'ULTRA VIRES'

A few days ago judgment was rendered in the various fishery cases at New Carlisle, by Hon. Justice Tessier, Judge of the Supreme Court for the district of Gaspé.

It might be well to recall the facts that led up to this important judgment.

In 1906 the Quebec Legislature enacted a law by which all persons not domiciled in the Province of Quebec, were refused the right to fish in said Province, unless they took out a license from the Quebec fishery department, which said license in the event of salmon fishing amounted to \$25 and in the case of trout fishing to the sum of \$10. The Province of Quebec has for many years been the great summer resort for anglers, and many of them, including a great number of Americans and New Brunswickers had bought up land in the Province of Quebec, which included fishery rights. This tax of \$25 and \$10 therefore, was very distasteful, to say the least, to these parties and many of them paid it only under protest.
