THREE BRIDGETOWN MEN HAVE ACQUIRED INTERESTS IN THE LUMBER AND LARD OF NORTH COAST. (Halifax Herald.)

One of the matters which will come before the Newfoundland legislature, now in session, is in connection with an important lumbering enterprise in Labrador, in which three lumber merchants of Bridgetown, Annapolis, are directly interested.

TOWN COUNCIL RESOLUTION. "ORDERED, That the Clerk call the attention of the ratifiers and others to the by-laws relating to the registration of dogs, horses, and water taxes, and publishing a notice in the town of the time when the same may be registered in a book to be kept at the Town Clerk's office on or before the first day of June in each year, the following of the by-laws shall be observed: Sec. 1.—The owner or keeper of any dog or dogs within the Town of Bridgetown shall report in writing to the Clerk at his office in the name of every such dog as well as his own name and address in one text, at the office of the Town Clerk, on or before the first day of June in each year, the following of the by-laws shall be observed: Sec. 2.—A tax of one dollar shall be paid by the owner or keeper of any dog or dogs within the Town of Bridgetown on or before the first day of June in each year, the following of the by-laws shall be observed: Sec. 3.—Every person who is the owner or keeper of any dog or dogs within
