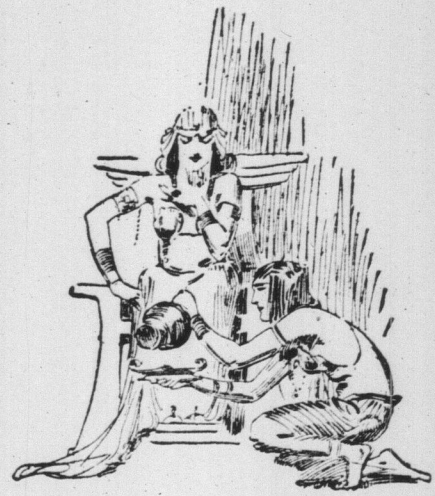

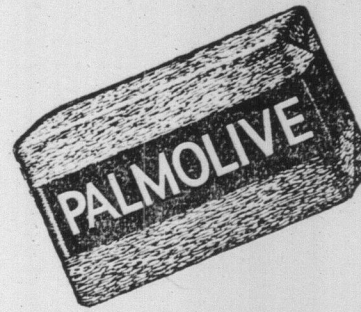

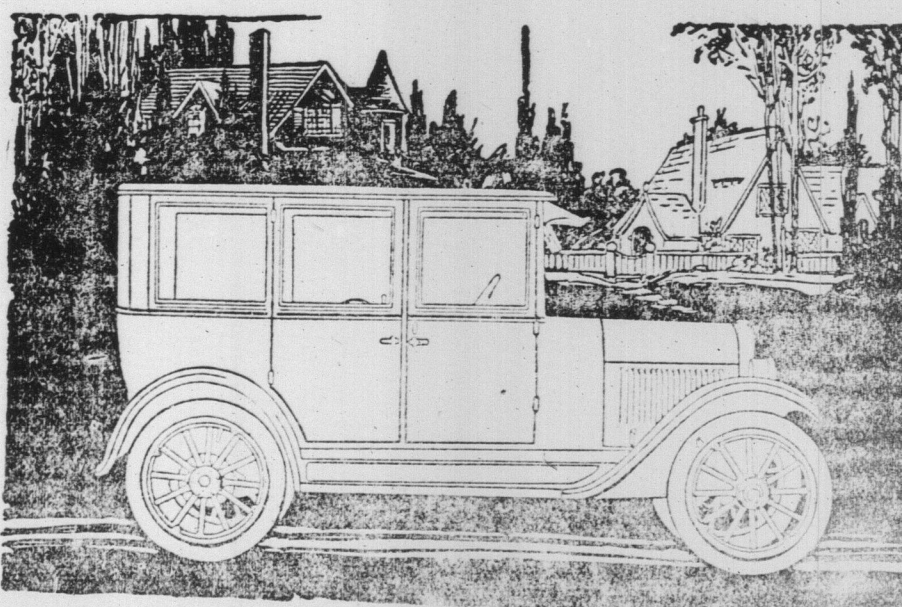

Town Meeting

Lawrenceville.—Hon. J. W. L. Dominion Minister, Agriculture, addressed a meeting in the Agricultural Extension Building, Lawrenceville, on Thursday afternoon, in presence of the Agricultural J. B. Hall occupied the podium and introduced the speaker. The audience had already met with Mr. Motherwell and with his gracious manner.
