ALBERTA'S ADVANTAGES.

Now that Coal Harbor has been settled upon as the terminus of the Canadian Pacific Railway, many of those who took part in the Manitoba boom, are looking to this new field in which to exercise their speculative craze. Alberta at the same time can claim all the natural advantages of British Columbia both as regard climate and its mineral resources. Alberta can boast of having the best of coal in abundance, in nearly every part of the District; and other minerals, which only await development to establish the fact of the vast mineral wealth and other resources of the

District. Settlers both new and old are unanimous in expressing their sat isfaction with the advantages offered by the District of Alberta.

The weather the past week has been the worst possible kind for the range. Only enough chinook to soften the snow, followed by col winds, which have added several more layers of crust to the snow.

The diameter of trees varies not only from summer to winter, but from day to day. They are larger from noon until twilight, next morning than from twilight to noon. They are smaller in winter than in summer. Water and the sap of trees expand not only in proportion as they rise above Low temperature as well as high premotes evaporation, and the trees evaporate from their branches in winter, and so the colder the weather the more they shrink.

> Each settler on a homestead quarter section not having timber on it, may, on application to the Local Agent of Dominion Lands, purchase a wood lot not exceeding twenty acres in extent, at five dollars per acre.

Any person other than a homestead settler desiring permission to cut timber, must make application therefor to the Minister of the Interior, who will deal with such application according to law.

Persons who have already cut timber with out authority, must pay the dues thereon to the Crown Timber Agent at his office, on or before the 1st of May, 1885; otherwise the said timber will be confiscated under the ore visions of the Dominion Lands Act.
