

CATS FOR RATS.—The best remedy we have tried for rats, is cats. I had rather keep half a dozen cats than that number of rats. Once we thought we could not endure a cat on the premises, but when the rats ran everywhere—through the buildings, into the garden, chicken and gosling coops, and would face a person with such an insulting look—we caved in. We keep three (one is eight years old), the year through; at times there are more. What we cannot give away we allow a free ride when old enough to take care of themselves. A cat should not be fed any meat; give plenty of milk, some potatoes, crumbs of bread, etc. Rats, for the past ten years, have been few and far between; the cats stand as sentinels, and take them soon after making their appearance on the farm. *Cor. 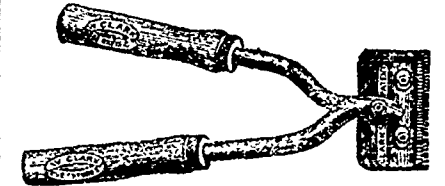
