#### HALIFAX NOTES.

They have a novel postal system in Newfoundland, The Government, or rather the Post Office Dept., will insure parcels of mail matter, charging a premium as follows:

On amounts up to \$24 On every additional \$24 12c

The amount of Insurance on any one parcel, however, cannot exceed \$240. Now most countries have one registration rate for both local and foreign letters, but Newfoundland has no less than three rates, as under:

Inland or local Se. To U. K 4c. Canada, U. S. etc. Se

and all other countries, same as single rate of postage,
