GOOD FINANCING. Bishop Wigger, of the Diocese of Newark, has confirmed the report that he proposes to make a loan of \$1,500,000 from an English syndicate to be used in taking up mortgages on churches in his diocese, upon which five per cent. interest is exacted. Under the new arrangement only three and a half per cent, interest will be charged by the foreign syndicate.

It is estimated that the Catholic Church property in this diocese, which is worth about \$10,000,000, is mortgaged for nearly \$2,000,000. The syndicate considers the property giltedge security and is willing to advance another million if the loan of

\$1,500,000 does not prove sufficient. The priests of the Newark diocese consider the Bishop's work in getting this loan to be a great stroke of cuterprise. They figure that the parishes will save \$30,000 if not more.


