his summer, the Professional School of the Canadian Foreign Service Institute (CFSI) is launching three new programs designed to meet everchanging needs of DFAIT. Employees are continually being asked to adapt to changing contingencies and CFSI has recognized this through new and innovative designs. The three new programs are: the CANA Mid-Career Professionals SER Program, the Locally Engaged Program and the

The Mid-Career Professionals Program has been designed to offer individuals in mid-career specifically tailored training and development opportunities in the form of "in-situ" offerings, based on the identified needs of employees and divisional directors. As announced in Panorama (No.18, May 1, 1995), the program is being offered first in Ottawa to officers who are departing on post this summer. The courses, offered in conjunction with preposting briefings, include: Management of Staff Abroad, Project Management, Management of Programs Abroad, Promoting

Intercultural Effectiveness Pilot.

Canadian Interests and Intelligence Gathering and Dissemination. In-Situ offerings begin in the fall of 1995. For further information on this program, please contact Lucie Sauriol at 944-0038.

Locally engaged personnel are the backbone of our global network. They comprise the majority of our

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personnel serving our clients at foreign posts. It is recognized that our locally engaged colleagues require more training than they have had in the past in order to equip them to perform more effectively in the new environment. CFSI is addressing this via an active plan for customized training to meet the needs of the LES. Beginning this summer, a needs analysis will be conducted to assess the training requirements. Recognizing a changing business environment and new roles emerging for the LES, training in areas such as personal and work group management skills, will be factored in. Alternative delivery mechanisms are also being assessed – such as computer based training and distance learning techniques. A training pilot is planned this fiscal year – as a start to a long term program to develop and deliver training for the locally engaged staff. The Intercultural Effectiveness Program is current-

ly in the design stage as a result of a comprehensive needs analysis conducted in

March. A pilot course will be given this summer with the Spanish students already at the Bisson centre in language training. The results of this intercultural experience will be used for the design of comprehensive program offerings for 1995-96. This area has been of interest to DFAIT employees for some time and CFSI is proud to offer its first pilot in only six months.
