1. What are the names of the chartered banks now doing business in Canada?

2. How many branches, by provinces, were operated in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, (a) in 1930; (b) in 1945?

3. Which, if any, of such banks maintain at certain points, a part-time banking service only, and in what centres?

1. Bank of Montreal, The Bank of Nova Scotia, The Bank of Toronto, La Banque Provinciale du Canada, The Canadian Bank of Commerce, The Royal Bank of Canada, The Dominion Bank, Banque Canadienne Nationale, Imperial Bank of Canada, Barclays Bank (Canada).

2. The chartered banks of Canada are not required under the provisions of the Bank Act to furnish information to the Minister of Finance regarding the number of branches operated.

Unofficial sources show the chartered banks operated branches as follows:

## HOGS

Mr. CAMPBELL:

1. How many hogs were requisitioned for the export market from each of the prairie provinces during the week ending October 11, 1945, and what price was paid?

2. Would this price involve any loss to the prairie farmers had they received the domestic price?

3. How many hogs were requisitioned for export from each of the other provinces during the same period and at what price?

4. How would the export price compare with the price for domestic use?

5. Has the government considered making good any loss sustained by prairie farmers whose hogs may have been requisitioned?

Mr. GARDINER:

1. 3,244,707 pounds of bacon was put into cure for export in the three prairie provinces during the week ending October 13, 1945. This quantity is equivalent to approximately 26,596 hogs.

The following schedule of prices, per 100 pounds f.a.s. Canadian seaboard, will apply to product put into cure during the week ending October 13, 1945, when delivered at seaboard:
