POLLUTION

LAKE HURON—SOURCE OF MERCURY CONTAMINATION—USE OF FISH FOR ANIMAL FOOD

JORDAN—INQUIRY AS TO FURTHER ASSISTANCE

Mr. Heath Macquarrie (Hillsborough): Mr. Speaker, my question is directed to the Secretary of State for External Affairs. Will he advise whether there are in contemplation any further measures for assistance to Jordan, where the situation is grave?

Hon. Mitchell Sharp (Secretary of State for External Affairs): Mr. Speaker, as members of the House may know, we have recently made two grants for the relief of conditions in Jordan—a \$25,000 grant to the Red Cross and an additional \$150,000, I think, over and above the very large amount already granted for the assistance of refugees. We have no further requests under consideration. I believe it is considered that Canada has made a very generous contribution.
