I am in receipt of your letter about the Department and phychology and Dr Hickson and so on. You will know of course that I think this in the right spirit, and that I am touched to the quick by your frank, kind monitory words. I think that you know how readily I will rally to the intimation and the reminder from you my Chief and my friend.

You say that you must state the fact that the Department of Philosophy is now and has been for some years in a very unsatisfactory state. And you open by saying that one of the first things you have was about a desire to divide the Department of Philosophy and the Department of Psychology.

(1) There is a broad and an age-long issue here, none

the less than the complete freedom of a science from any
domination by philosophy or religion and so on. This has
resulted in most Universities that Psychology be put entirely
on its own feet - independent of Philosophy or absolutely independent in the philosophical Department. This issue is not
touched by your next sentence "I could see no necessity for
such an action in the University of ours nor do I see any
necessity at the present time." I myself after a long reflection on this subject, a knowledge of what is done in other
Universities, and also in view of the Guild situation an
