

THE SENATE OF CANADA

BILL D<sup>12</sup>.

An Act for the relief of Charles Lewis Lipton.

Preamble.

WHEREAS Charles Lewis Lipton, domiciled in Canada and residing at the city of Outremont, in the province of Quebec, agent, has by his petition alleged that on the twenty-ninth day of March, A.D. 1947, at the city of Verdun, in the said province, he and Mary Pickering, who was then of the city of Montreal, in the said province, a spinster, were married; and whereas by his petition he has prayed that, because of her adultery since then, their marriage be dissolved; and whereas the said marriage and adultery have been proved by evidence adduced and it is expedient that the prayer of his petition be granted: Therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:—

Marriage dissolved.

1. The said marriage between Charles Lewis Lipton and Mary Pickering, his wife, is hereby dissolved, and shall be henceforth null and void to all intents and purposes whatsoever.

Right to marry again.

2. The said Charles Lewis Lipton may at any time hereafter marry any woman whom he might lawfully marry if the said marriage with the said Mary Pickering had not been solemnized.
