ed by the Manner in which they trifled with Conscience, and vindicated those Ministers who preserved no public Faith, where the Electoral Insterests came in Competition with the Honour and Advantage of your Country.

THE fingular and prevailing Sentiments in which it was inviolably persevered, during that Period, were that few German Electors were the Fathers of their Wive's Chi'dren, which made them careless who were Heirs of their Dominions. That all Sovereigns ought to be despotic, as the Effect of which, it was Pain to behold the liberal Countenance of a free People, which constantly reminds Men they are not absolute, and for which Reason it was frequently the Custom to indulge the Lust of Despotism in the Company of Slaves. And lastly, that Englishmen ought to labor for Wealth to wanton away on German Purposes; in Confequence of which, your Minister had no Mercy on your Liberties and Properties. So confummately Hinoverian was the Temper of the Times, it does not appear the august Donation of these Realms, created one Moment's Gratitude in the Hearts of your King's Ministry.

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
