NINETEENTH YEAR

NO ANSWER YET TO THE PEACE PROPOSALS

President and His Advisers Had a Discussion of Five Hours' Duration.

AGREEMENT REACHED ON MOST POINTS

Independence of Cuba to be Demanded—Porto Rico to be Ceded to the United States—Coaling Stations in Caroline and Ladrone Islands—The Whole Trouble Will be Over the Philippines.

Washington, D.C., July 29.—Nearly five hours' earnest discussion by the President and his constitutional advisers of the nature of the response to be made by the Government to the Spanish overture for peace brought no conclusion and the subject necessarily was postponed for further consideration at another meeting of the Cabinet, to be held at 10.30 o'clock to-morrow morning.

Such was the formal statement of the situation made at the conclusion of today's work of each member of the Cabinet was questioned upon the subject. A final conclusion, however, is much nearer than this statement would seem to indicate, and indeed there is little reason to doubt that an agreement has been reached upon all the substantial points at issue, and that which remains to be done to-morrow is rather to smooth away inequalities and adjust some very minor points of difference before making the answer expected by Mr. Cambon.

Philippines the Crucible.
The point under discussion during the greater part of the meeting was what disposition should be made of the Philippines. On the other issues, unanimity developed. There was to be independence demanded for Cuba; Porto Rico was to be ceded to the United States; coaling stations were to be acquired at Guamo, in the Ladrone Islands, and in the Caroline Islands. These propositions were adopted of quietly, but when it came to the Philippines some diversity of opinion was revealed.

Military Operations to Go On.
Another point that was settled, though there was no formal action on it, was that no protest against the continuance of military or naval operations, pending the peace negotiations, would avail in the slightest; that there would be no armistice, no suspension of operations, nor any modification whatever of present plans until the Spanish Government had agreed to the terms proposed.

Incident to the cession of Porto Rico and the recognition of Cuban independence by Spain was the decision that every vestige of Spanish government and authority in the Caribbean and West Indian waters must be removed, effecting a material acquisition of numerous islands over which the Spanish flag flies, one of the most important of which is the Isle of Pines. Furthermore, this sweeping change of authority from Spain to the United States in nearby waters is to be effective also as a quit claim of all indebtedness assumed by the Spanish Government and charged by her to those islands, so far as the United States is concerned, and all commercial treaties now existing between the Spanish Government and her possessions there and outside powers are extinguished.

A Divergence of Views.
Some discussion was had as to the probability of the Spanish acceptance of the American terms. The views differed, though it can be stated that several of the most influential members of the Cabinet believed that the terms submitted agreed on would not be accepted by Spain at once. While believing that the propositions made should in all reason constitute the minimum to be considered, some expressed the belief that Spain would not be immediately disposed to reach an agreement on them and that possibly a considerable lapse of time would take place before Spain would yield, meantime seeking a compromise, which, it was asserted, was not to be entertained for a moment.

Present Situation in Philippines.
One factor in the protracted discussion of the Philippine problem was the absence of advice as to the existing situation there on this date, a point that might be of considerable importance in the adjustment of the question. The unconfirmed dispatch reporting Manila had surrendered was read and commented on as indicating that decisive action without knowledge of the exact situation at Manila might cause a statement regarding conditions that did not exist. The formal papers crystallizing the results of the two sessions will be ready for action to-morrow. A formal vote will then be taken, and the answer of this Government is likely to be communicated to Spain before nightfall.

The News From Miles.
The most important news received at the War Department to-day was the cable from General Miles, announcing the excellent progress being made in southern Porto Rico and the capture of Ponce. The Navy Department also received a cable announcing that the navy had captured the city of Ponce and landed the forces under General Miles. The department expects an easy conquest of Porto Rico. The belief is general in the War Department that General Merritt has landed in Manila, though no cable information to that effect has been received.

The Queen watched her son for two nights when told that the measles had developed, but presented only an ordinary character, she went to her private oratory and knelt on the floor, sobbing and crying bitterly. Then she recovered her composure, called the Infanta Isabella (her sister-in-law) and asked her to take care of her (the Queen's) daughters—the Princesses of the Asturias and the Infanta Maria Theresa, whose quarters are at the other end of the palace—in order that they may escape the contagion. For fifteen days the Queen will not see them, having resolved to remain by her son.

His faithful old valet, Antonio, and his English nurse take turns with the officers in the sick room. The King is a very cheerful invalid, especially when his mother is with him. She reads aloud to him despite the advice of the doctors, and takes little food or rest. Very considerably she told her Ministers who have children that she would dispense with their attendance.

Trouble Over Cuban Debt.
London, July 29.—The Daily Graphic this morning points out that there is a probability of an international question arising over the difficulty of dealing with the Cuban debt, since a majority of the Spanish bondholders are Frenchmen.

Manila Has Surrendered.
Paris, July 29.—A dispatch from Madrid to the Paris edition of The New York Herald says the Spanish Government has received a cable message announcing the surrender of Manila to Rear Admiral Dewey.

Want to Hold Philippines.
San Francisco, July 29.—The Merchants' Association has adopted a resolution, petitioning the President to hold and retain the Philippine Islands. Similar action will probably be taken within the next day or two.

LA BOURDOUXE VICTIMS.

Bodies Too Much Decomposed for Recognition—One Identified.
St. John's, Nfld., July 29.—The port officers refused permission to examine articles taken from the bodies of the victims of the La Bourdoux, which arrived yesterday. The bodies, which were floating near the scene of the wreck, were too much decomposed for recognition, hence the articles from the bodies were taken to identify them. The identification is positive in the case of the Galliard of New Orleans. He was bound for Paris. His pockets contained a passport, a check, baggage checks, money and letters were taken from his pocket; also his gold watch and a letter, apparently from his wife, written from New Orleans, June 29, bidding him a tearful goodbye.

An elderly woman, aged about 55, with grey hair, was dressed in a black skirt and green lining, a black jacket and black knit bloomers and wore three rings, a gold wedding ring, another gold ring with a pearl and two diamonds, and the third ring was one of iron. A girl about 25, dark, slight and well formed, apparently a French or Italian gentleman, had one gold ring, which was removed. The ring had a plain dark stone, almost square. This woman had on gold earrings shaped like twisted wire, but they were not removed, as it would have cut the flesh. She wore a white dress, white blouse and had cut studs of bone, inlaid with a circle of gold.

QUEBEC HAS A BIG DEFICIT

That is if Hon. Mr. Marchand's Figuring is Correct.

Mr. Gabriel Marchand Earned Applause for His Patriotic Action, But It Was Found That His Sacrifice Did Not Work Particularly Against His Own Interests—Montreal News.

Montreal, July 29.—(Special.)—Hon. Felix Marchand, in a speech at Tadoussac, has been throwing some light on the financial state of the present Government. During the speech in question, the Quebec Premier announced that the deficit for the year ending June 30 would be \$250,000. The speaker took consolation from the fact that he made a moment later, that the deficit for the last year of the Flyn Administration was \$500,000.

A week or two since the whole Province of Quebec was applauding the patriotism of Mr. Gabriel Marchand, son of the Prime Minister, for having resigned the position of registrar to resume the practice of law. It now turns out that there was not quite so much disinterestedness in Mr. Marchand's act as some people supposed, for it is stated that he will get the comparatively fat job of representing the province at the Paris Exhibition.

Wholesale Grocers' Meeting.
The wholesale grocers of Canada have been meeting here yesterday and to-day, but their deliberations are carried on with closed doors. Amongst those who were present were Messrs. The extra duty arises out of the abrogation of the Zollverein Treaty, which abrogation comes into effect on the 1st prox. By the tariff formed under this abrogation, goods manufactured in Belgium and Germany are discriminated against to the extent of 25 per cent. in favor of British-made goods. Several vessels are at present bound for this port, carrying goods that are liable to the discriminating tariff if they are not entered at customs before Saturday. Mr. R. S. White, Collector of Customs, has given notice that duties will be taken to-morrow evening at 8 o'clock.
