In reply to the deputation which I had the honor of meeting yetserday, I desire to express my concurrence in the view presented by the different speakers, that nothing short of the prohibition of the sale of liquors in hotels and the strict control over sales, for purposes generally recognized as proper and eigitimate, would fully rotect society from the evil effects of excessive mate, would fully rotect society from the evil effects of excessive drinking, so far as legislation can be invoked for that purpose. Your decided preference for such a measure as against amend-ments of the license laws I un-derstand to mean that you do derstand to mean that you do not favor at present any other form of temperance legislation. 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A GENUINE CLASSIC.

In the midst of the rush and hurry and nervous strain of the present age, it is refreshing to read a document like the reply of Premier Ross to the Methodist and Baptist ministers on the question of prohibition. The composition of this occupied some 50 hours, a little more than the 48 hours for which the premier stipulated. Allowing reasonable intervals for rest and refreshment, the premier and his friends must have composed some six words an hour. It was worth all the time. The slightest haste or carelessness might have been disastrous, destroying all pleasing
