Translating into French the evidence of the telephone committee, \$2000 salary to W. P. Archibald of the Salvator Army as Dominion prison parole officer, \$10,000 further for health of animals, \$25,000 for the purchase of land surveys and \$100,000 for improvements on east branch of Holland River to Newmarket, contribution of \$2000 to school of railway engineering in McGill, Georgian Bay Canal survey, \$70,000, departmental commission, \$25,000; public works engineering branch, \$125,000; Canada-Mexican steamship service, \$50,000; additional job-breaking steamer for the St. Lawrence, \$175,000; patrol boat for the Northwest Mounted Police in Hudson Bay, \$40,000, and \$65,000 for the Hudson Bay patrol generally; construction of light-house, etc., \$472,000; for a fish-curing establishment, \$12,000; experimental works for reduction of dog tax \$500,000; for a monument system for Banff, \$95,000; for a monument to Champlain at St. John, \$4000, and a similar arrangement for the anniversary of the founding of the city, etc., \$5000. An additional \$250,000 is asked for mail service and \$250,000 for naval militia organization and use of the cruiser Canada as a training ship.

HAMILTON POLICE TO STOP YOUNG GIRLS' WANDERINGS

Magistrate Has Given His Assurance to That Effect to Children's Aid Society.

Hamilton, July 4.—(Special.)—At the annual meeting of the Children's Aid Society this afternoon it was agreed to engage an officer to act for the society under the direction of Trustee Officer Hunter. The following officers were elected: Adam Brown, president; Lieut.-Col. Moore, W. H. Wardrop, K.C., and A. Robinson, vice-presidents; J. M. Burns, treasurer; W. Hunter, secretary; J. J. Kelso, and many of the local clergy delivered addresses.

The Whitney government was commended for passing legislation prohibiting the serving of liquor to minors. The president, Adam Brown, stated in his report that the police magistrate had assured him that he would put a stop to the practice of young girls wandering about the streets. Complaint was made that the city council had taken no action to provide a shelter for children.

The engagement of Captain J. C. Thomson to Miss Taylor, daughter of Sir Thomas Taylor, is announced. Miss Elizabeth G. Peene, third daughter of Alfred Peene, was wedded this morning in the Church of St. Thomas to Franklin M. Jones, New York. A. Sherman of New York was best man, and Miss Lillie M. W. Peene was the bridesmaid.

APPEAL FOR FUNDS

The subject of ministers' salaries was again discussed by the Hamilton presbytery today. The Augmentation Fund committee will arrange a general exchange of pulpits after the second Sunday in September when special appeals will be made. A special meeting will be held July 15 to deal with the call extended to Rev. Dr. Mackenzie, Beverly, by the Sherburne church, Rev. Dr. Smith, St. Catharines, was appointed moderator.

MORIN VOTES WITH BORDEN—SURPRISES HIS COLLEAGUES

Still It Didn't Prevent Second Reading of Saskatchewan Bill—Some Other Noteworthy Votes.

Ottawa, July 4.—(Special.)—When Jean Baptiste Morin, the Conservative member for Dorchester, wakes up tomorrow morning he will find that he has voted in favor of the new Province of Saskatchewan dealing with its educational policy as it sees fit without any interference of the federal government.

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SAWBONES VERY SERIOUS OPPOSING NEW HOSPITAL

Governors and Trustees of Smaller Hospitals Will Go With Doctors to City Council.

There will be wigs on the green when the city council meets next Monday, to take up the board of control's recommendation that \$200,000 be granted toward the new hospital. In Grace hospital last night there was a large gathering of medical men, governors and trustees of the hospitals other than the General Hospital. Had they decided to go to the city hall and make their views plain to the council? They didn't. Dr. Palmer presided, and the meeting was pretty well unanimous. The council will be asked why the \$200,000 should not be given to any of the existing hospitals or shared up between them, and why the present disapproval should be disturbed. It will be protested that the location of the hospital at present is admirably suited to the needs of the public, and it will be claimed that the new hospital would mean a great increase in the cost to the city of looking after the poor of the city, because the city would have to pay for poor patients who still have to be paid, and in addition to the cost of \$200,000, the city would have to pay a large tract of valuable property, and the city would have to meet the cost of perhaps \$25,000 or \$30,000 a year.

NOT PROFESSIONAL QUARREL

The doctors who are leading the opposition to the new hospital are not professional quarrel, and are not trying to get the credit for their fair share in what they assert is a fight for the rights of the people and not a fight for doctors' rights any more than for the city and the citizens generally. They bitterly oppose any proposal to tear down or to demolish the General Hospital, thus leaving the east end of the city without a hospital at all. They show that the present hospitals are distributed most conveniently and accessible from any part of the city, and that a new hospital in the locality proposed would wreck any consideration of their views by council. Tom Crawford, M.L.A., was present at the meeting, and he said the matter should be submitted to the city council, and that the smaller hospitals should be closed down, and the other hospitals combined and averaged, thus showing that the smaller hospitals are not needed. The average daily pauper patients in the city is 75, and the total number of patients treated at the General Hospital last year was 11,000. The other hospitals combined averaged 350, thus showing that the smaller hospitals are not needed.

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CAN PRESIDENT MACKENZIE CLOSE UP EDMOND STREET?

Head of T. R. G. Cheerfully Prepared to Prove That He Can—City That He Cannot.

"Yes, there must be an appeal to the courts if both sides keep to their present stand." So says the City Solicitor Chisholm of a problem that the recent annexation of the Avenue-road district has brought within the city range. The case, which has features that make it unique, first had its introduction a week ago last Tuesday, when certain residents of Poplar Plains, in the vicinity appeared before the board of control to protest against an attempt said to have been made by a private individual to close a thoroughfare that had been in public use for over 20 years. The city declared that it would not give any notice of the thoroughfare on June 23, and had disturbed the minds of residents so much that they were obliged to petition the board of control. The latest development in what Controller Spence terms a most remarkable case, was the visit of Controller Spence and Ward to the theatre of the Grand Opera House, where a few minutes' walk from the Avenue-road street terminus at Dupont-street, the thoroughfare, over the objection of which a legal battle of more than 20 years' duration has been going on, was being held.

HOW IT WAS DONE

To the broad acres of Benvenuto, fronting the Grand Opera House, on the east side, Mr. Mackenzie not long ago made addition by the purchase of a residence situated at the corner of the Avenue-road, and upon the north side. In so doing this is Mr. Mackenzie's claim, and he acquired the property by means of a closing up of a roadway, but it was intimated that Mr. Mackenzie was prepared to stand by his rights.
