BELLEVILLE MOB GRABS VISITOR

Government Official, Mistaken for Assassin, Has a Narrow Escape.

Belleville, Nov. 25.—There was a wild time in this city for an hour or so last night. For the past few days the citizens have been greatly worked up over the assaults which have taken place.

The assault on little Myrtle McCune on Friday night was the last, and public opinion was on the qui vive, because it was known that the police expected to make an arrest in connection with it.

Last night Front street was crowded, and suddenly there was wild commotion. As near as one can get to the story, it is said that a woman near the stranger, who was waiting along, and denounced him as the man who had been committing the outrages.

Some men who were near pounced upon him. Luckily a policeman was near and took the man in charge.

The story started that a man had been arrested who had been caught attempting to assault a woman, and in about no time a big crowd had gathered, many of whom were in favor of harsh measures.

The man had been staying at the Anglo-American Hotel, and there the police took him to escape the mob. By this time there was a crowd of several hundred in the street, and Front street was blocked for fifty yards.

It was lucky the policeman took the man into the hotel, or he might have been seriously hurt.

Explanations quickly showed that the man arrested could not possibly have been connected with the assaults. He is a Government official here for a day or two on business, and quickly convinced the police that a mistake had been made.

The chief of police addressed the crowd, explained the mistake, and the crowd dispersed. No arrests have yet been made in connection with the McCune assault.

CHARGED WITH BIGAMY
Former Evangelist to Answer Serious Accusation at Toronto.

Toronto, Nov. 25.—Donald Ferguson, a middle-aged man, was arrested yesterday at the Union station and taken into custody, charged with bigamy and with having stolen \$400. Marian Medley is the complainant in both cases.

Ferguson will come up in the police court tomorrow.

According to the story told by the police, Ferguson met Mrs. Medley in Winnipeg three years ago while the woman was visiting a sister there. He was at that time conducting evangelist services in Winnipeg, and they were later married in Niagara Falls.

Shortly after the marriage the young wife handed over \$400 to Ferguson and after she had done so she learned Ferguson had a wife living in Toronto.

Ferguson's arrest was the sequel.

MOTHER'S DARING DEED
Dashes Through Fire and Smoke of Burning Home to Save Baby.

Brantford, Nov. 24.—There was an exciting time on the borders of the Indian reserve when it was noticed that a cottage occupied by Mrs. Harry Whitlow, whose husband is in Toronto, was on fire. Mrs. Whitlow had gone out to her mother's, a distance of some 300 yards, to get some milk, and left four children in the house.

Luckily she stayed there for only a few minutes, for when she started home she saw three of the biggest children crying and calling her.

She also noticed that her cottage was on fire. She ran forward, and when she reached home the main portion of the house inside was ablaze and the house full of smoke. She rushed into the kitchen and snatched out of the cradle a baby five weeks old. She had just reached outside when the fire burst into the kitchen.

Men from all directions had reached the scene by 10 o'clock and started to fight the fire, but it had got too much of a headway. The only things saved were a table, two chairs and a sewing machine.

A DEADLY CROSSING
Charles Reynolds, Stratford, Run Down and Killed at Woodstock.

Woodstock, Nov. 26.—Charles Reynolds, of Stratford, was killed on the Wilson street crossing of the Grand Trunk Railway yesterday afternoon.

Reynolds came off the 3:15 train from the west. He was on his way to Stratford and had to wait until 6 o'clock for the train.

He wandered about the city, and about 4:30 o'clock found him in the vicinity of Wilson street crossing. He was about to cross on the sidewalk, when an eastbound freight train, going at only a fairly good rate of speed, struck him.

No one appears to have witnessed the accident.

Reynolds was found in a ditch by the roadside, and was still living when picked up. He was taken to the hospital, where he lingered for some hours.

CRATER CRUMBLES
Naples, Nov. 25.—Proceeded by loud detonations, another portion of the crater of Mount Vesuvius, on the nearest Pompeii, collapsed yesterday and the volcano threw out ashes, cinders and smoke, which rose like an immense umbrella.

Professor Matteucci, director of the royal observatory on Mount Vesuvius, continues to declare that there is no danger of an eruption.

ST. MARYS DEFEATS THE LOAN BYLAW

By a Majority of Three in Large Poll Decides Against Loan to Traction Company.

St. Marys, Nov. 25.—The bylaw to loan \$40,000 to the North Midland Electric Railway Company was defeated here yesterday by a majority of three votes.

The vote polled was one of the largest—if not the largest—in the history of the town, 579 votes being recorded.

HALIBUT TRAWL FAILS
Vessels Purchased by Vancouver Fishermen Will Be Dismantled.

Vancouver, B. C., Nov. 26.—The trawling for halibut on this coast has received more than a fair test and it has failed. Such is the opinion of the masters of vessels which have for several months been engaged in trawling on the northern halibut banks.

The result is that the trawlers Flamingo and Celestial Empire will be converted into dory-fishing steamers, the former immediately, and the latter in the course of a short time.

The work of dismantling the trawls on the steamer Flamingo is now proceeding, and when she sails for the north next week she will carry twelve dories.

When the trawlers were purchased in England and brought out to this coast, it was thought by many people that they would revolutionize the halibut-fishing industry here, because the fish could be taken by trawls more cheaply than by dories.

According to all the accounts of masters and fishermen, the trouble with the trawls seems to be that the fish are too cunning a fish to be caught by them. Time and again it has been the experience of the trawlers to operate on banks where dories were also fishing. While the latter would secure good catches, the trawls would come up with nothing but a mess of small fish other than halibut.

It is said that the halibut is a keen-eyed fish and a remarkably fast swimmer. It is easy for this fish to avoid the trawls. On the other hand the dory fishermen, working with baited lines, which rest on the bottom, find no difficulty in securing good catches provided the weather is fair and they have ordinary luck on the banks.

NO OCCUPATION
Powers Plan as to Morocco Deal Solely With Policing.

Paris, Nov. 25.—The measures which France has agreed to take together in view of the increase of anarchy in Morocco, have been made public, and fully confirm the announcement made in these dispatches ten days ago.

They are strictly precautionary, and are designed solely to meet the requirements of an emergency and to safeguard the lives and property of foreigners at Tangier.

Pending the formal policing of the ports of Morocco, to be undertaken upon the final ratification of the international agreement reached at Algiers, each power will maintain warships at Tangier and be prepared to land a force of 3,000 men.

It is distinctly understood that this joint movement will not assume the nature of an occupation, but the mission of the troops is limited "to safeguarding and re-establishing the authority of the pasha at Tangier as against Raisuli."

TIGERS GOT AWAY WITH ARGONAUTS

Striped Ones Had No Difficulty in Winning the Final Game for Championship.

Oakville, Ont., Nov. 25.—The Tigers of Hamilton defeated the Argonauts of Toronto here today in the final game for the O. R. F. U. intermediate championship. In the first quarter the score stood, Argos 8, Tigers 2, but in the second quarter and balance of the game the Argonauts were not in it. The final score was 25 to 7 in favor of the Tigers.

Col. Denison's Regret
Col. Denison complimented the police on the way they acted, and said his only regret was that he had not used their batons more freely. He issued the following warning today:

"I assumed the position that after the riot act is read no respectable, law-abiding person will be found on the streets, and those that are will have to take their chances. If we are called out tomorrow we will clear the streets at any cost, and people for their own safety had better be in their own homes. The anarchy shown by seemingly good citizens to the requests of myself and other officers surprised me more than I can say, and I fail to see where there is any justification for such conduct. The people do not realize the consequences of not observing the law after the riot act is read."

Mayor Biggar called upon Police Magistrate Jelfs to accompany the soldiers, to give instructions when they were to fire, as they cannot fire except in self-defense unless they get instructions from a justice of the peace. The magistrate refused to act in that capacity, and told the mayor to do it himself. The mayor reported him to the Attorney-General's department.

After the riots of Saturday night the city is comparatively quiet tonight. The cars were taken in shortly after 8 o'clock, and while they were being moved, there were no organized attacks upon them. The streets, in spite of all the warnings, were filled with the usual Sunday night crowds, but everybody kept to the move, and there were no disorders to speak of in the central part of the city, though there were several hurried calls for the police from the car barns. The soldiers did not have to be called out today.

The list of Saturday night's casualties is very long. Constables Hallisey and Barrett were both laid out with stones and very seriously injured. Some of those who had their heads bound up were: Peter McRoberts, Florence street; Hans Hanson, John Mepham, J. Montgomery, Thomas Collins and a host of others. Constables Smith, May, Reynolds and Hill were all wounded.

Today the authorities ordered all the contractors who are doing work on new buildings on James and King streets to haul away all loose stones and bricks. There was a big pile taken away from the Bank of Hamilton building. A crowd got under a shed that is erected around the bank building on Saturday night and stoned the soldiers, until, Col. Denison says, he was on the point of firing into the crowd.

Acid was thrown on the horses of the dragoons, and one of them became unmanageable and backed through a plate glass window at Treble's.

Acid tonight the armories, in which the soldiers are quartered, are stoned. A big gang gathered at the southeast corner of the Stuart street barns and shattered the windows. The police were called out and the arrested the following on the charge of being disorderly: Alfred Bailey, 185 Princess street; Thomas Wilson, 157 East Simcoe street.

Robert Speers, 362 North Ferguson avenue.

Frank Fitzgerald, the man who was assaulted by a strike-breaker, was reported to be somewhat improved tonight. The policemen began to realize today that the soldiers turn a new trick on the police. The military officers ordered the police to use their batons on the crowds, and then they kept their own men from doing anything of the kind, except when hard pressed. While some of the constables were brutal, a majority of the comrades kept their heads and are sorry for what happened.

CARUSO CAN APPEAL.
New York, Nov. 26.—Judge O'Sullivan in the court of general sessions today, signed an order granting a right to appeal in the case of Enrico Caruso, the Italian opera singer, who was found guilty in the municipal court of annoying women in the monkey house at Central Park and fined \$10.
