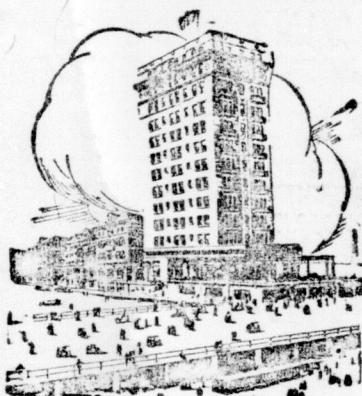

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CAMPAIGN TO RAISE \$15,000 IN AID OF OVERSEAS Y. M. C. A.

City to Help Work Organization Is Doing in Trenches.

COMMITTEES ARE NAMED

Leading Speakers From All Over the Dominion Are Coming Here.

During the next fortnight London will be the centre of considerable activity in connection with Y. M. C. A. work. This week there have been several meetings of citizens interested who have consulted with Dr. John Brown, Jun., the associated general secretary of the Y. M. C. A. National Council, who visited the city in order to lay the foundation for an organization in connection with the raising of funds for the Y. M. C. A. military work. Dr. Brown was accompanied by Mr. N. B. McKibbin, who is also one of the organizers employed by the National Council.

Dr. Brown gave a detailed outline of the budget requirements for the coming year, stating that the total requirements of the National Council is \$720,000, of which 34 per cent is devoted to military work. The estimate is that the military work will require a fund of more than double the amount spent for the year just past. The Y. M. C. A. has become such a great factor in the welfare of the soldiers that the demands upon the association have exceeded all estimates.

Lieut. Gerald of Waterloo, who has recently returned from the front was present at one of the meetings and gave a most interesting description of the Y. M. C. A. work in France. He showed that the soldiers looked to the Y. M. C. A. huts as a social centre, and gave eloquent testimony to the beneficial efforts of the association's work in keeping up the spirits of the men.

To Raise \$15,000. The citizens gathered at the London meetings enthusiastically decided in favor of assuming the sum of \$15,000 as this city's share in the association's work, and organized for the campaign with the following officers: George M. Reid, honorary chairman; A. E. Silverwood, chairman; J. K. McDermaid, vice-chairman; Gordon Phillip, secretary; J. S. Moore, treasurer. A strong committee was appointed to organize the teams for the campaign.

It is hoped that some interesting speakers who have been overseas will address public mass meetings in London before the campaign opens. Among those who are expected to come here are Major Gerald W. Birks of Montreal, and Capt. W. A. Cameron. Major Birks is a member of the well-known jewelry firm of Henry Birks & Sons of Montreal, and has been in charge of the business end of the Y. M. C. A. among the Canadian troops in England. Capt. Cameron is the eloquent young pastor of the Bloor Street Baptist Church, Toronto, and has been nearly a year engaged in military work for the Y. M. C. A., both in Great Britain and France. These gentlemen have already appeared in a number of Canadian cities since their return from England about the middle of April. They tell thrilling stories, and Londoners will look forward with interest to hear them in this city.
