

CAMPAIGN TO RAISE \$15,000 IN AID OF OVERSEAS Y. M. C. A.

City to Help Work Organization Is Doing in Trenches.

During the next fortnight London will be the centre of considerable ac-

tivity in connection with Y. M. C. A work. This week there have teen sev eral meetigns of citizens interested who have consulted with Dr. John Brown, jun., the associated general secretary of the Y. M. C. A. Nationa Council, who visited the city in order to lay the foundation for an organization in connection with the raising of funds for the Y. M. C. A. military work. Dr. Brown gave a detailed outline of the budget requirements for the coming year, stating that the total requirements of the National Council is \$720,000, of which 94 per cent is devoted to military work.

The estimate is that the military work will require a fund of more than double the amount spent for the year just past. The Y. M. C. A. has become such a great factor in the welfare of the soldiers that the demands upon the association have exceeded all estimates.

Lieut. Gerald of Waterloo, who has recently returned from the front was present at one of the meetings and gave a most interesting description of the Y. M. C. A. work in France. He showed that the soldiers looked to the Y. M. C. A. huts as a social centre, and gave eloquent testimony to the beneficial efforts of the association's work in keeping up the spirits of the men.

To Raise \$15,000.

A strong committee was appointed to organize the teams for the campaign.
