Mr. Roosevelt was a great and inspiring figure far beyond his own country's snores, and the world is poorer for his loss."

CHARGES MAKERS WITH "BOLSTERING" COSTS Ottawa, Jan. 8 .- W. N. Tilley, counsel for the publishers, made his address before the paper control tribunal today in the appeal against the price of \$69 per ton fixed by Paper Controller Pringle for roll news. He charged that the paper mills, early in the Pringle inquiry, bolstered up their alleged costs of anufacture by charging a profit on each process—a profit on the original timber, as though they were timber dealers; a profit on groundwood, as though they were selling groundwood; a profit on sulphite, as though they were vendors of sulphite to themselves; and then over all, a profit such as they considered proper for a concern in the newsprint. "This system of arbitrary values," said Mr. Tilley, "was a result of the concerted action of the manufacturers aided and abetted in the United States, to show high costs. That was the purpose of it, word was passed around here, and the thing was done that way for the purpose of swelling costs." Mr. Tilley showed that Commissioner Pringle had not only declared that he would not probe into the possibility of a combine existing among Canadian paper mills, but had gone so far as to exclude evidence pertinent to the inquiry
