# MORTGAGES MADE BEFORE WAR.

Ontario Parliamentary Measure Which Operated Throughout War Expired Yesterday — Judges Will Have No Alternative But To Sign Foreclosures If Mortgagees Demand It.

Toronto, Oct. 2.—It is understood that notices are being prepared in legal offices in many cities in Ontario, particularly in the bigger cities, foreclosure of a large number of mortgages made before August 4, 1914, and now long since overdue, but protected more or less up till yesterday by the provincial moratorium, which operated throughout the war, but ended October 1.

In cases where these mortgages fell due and the principal was not paid, the high court juckes, under the moratorium, were permitted to allow the principal to stand unpaid, if the interest and rent payments were kept up. Under the laws of foreclosure now again operative, the courts have no alternative but to sign the foreclosure, if the mortgage due and unpaid, and the mortgage demands it.



## HISTORY OF BASEBALL FOR PAST DECADE IS TO BE INVESTIGATED

Cook County Grand Jury Will Act As Special Body For This Purpose.

McGRAW TO BE CALLED

Manager of New York Giants Will Appear On Tuesday.

Chicago, Oct. 2.—The Cook County grand jury, which has been conducting the investigation into the alleged "fixing" of the 1919 world's series today was to be made a special body to continue its search of baseball history for evidence of crookedness. The regular sessions of the grand jury were completed vesterday. sessions of the grand jury were completed yesterday.

There will be no session of the jury today other than a perfunctory one to dispose of the formalities making it a special body. Testimony will be resumed Monday, however, and on Tuesday John McGraw, manager of the New York Giants, and Benny Kauff, former outfielder of the New York Club, will take the stand.

Kauff and Toney, it is understood, will testify that they were offered \$500 and \$200 respectively to throw a game. They refused.

The grand jury will delve into reports of dishonesty in baseball, stretching back more than a decade, according to State's Attorney MacLay Hoyne.

In connection with this, it was reported that Charles Dooin, former manager of the Philadelphia Nationals, would be subpoenaed.

Dooin, in Atlantic City, said that in 1908 a man handed him a package containing \$8,000, and remarked that there was \$40,000 more in a bank if Dooin would "throw" the next game to New York.

## TAKE UP COURSES IN **AEROPLANE TRAINING**

Several Canadian Technical Schools To Include New Courses in Curriculum.

MUST BE VOLUNTEERS

Men Must Offer To Serve in Canadian Air Force in Emergency.

Toronto, Oct. 2.—All the intricacies which make up the modern aeropiane will soon be as familiar to Canadian mechanics as the war time machines were to Canadian pilots.

Forty applicants have applied in the first two days at the Toronto Technical School to take the new course in practical aero engine fitting and aeropiane rigging, indicating the rapidly growing demand for mechanics skilled in handling aircraft. Other technical schools throughout Ontario are about to institute such courses.

The University of Toronto has two men employed in research work and has

The University of Toronto has two men employed in research work and has started a class in aero dynamics.

Men eager to obtain experience under actual flying conditions are now given an opportunity by the Canadian Air Force to obtain training which cannot be had from books and lectures. Camp Borden, the first training station, is in operation and will be kept open all winter. The Ontario board of the Canadian Air Force Association is already sending up classes each Friday for a month's training. The association offices are at 34 Yonge street, Toronto.
