Prof. McMillan Reports Evidences of Former Luxuriant Vegetation. SYDNEY, N.S., Sept. 23.-According Prof. McMillan, who accompanied he Peary expedition to the Arctic here is sufficient evidence to prove the theory that the frigid zone

'I found large numbers of vegetable and marine fossils, which must be regarded as positive proof. In one huge rock, split open by frost, there was to be seen a perfect print of a great tropical forn.
