### SESSIONS COURT OPENED ONLY 2 CRIMINAL CASES

**True Bill Against W. J. Smith—Fire in a Freight Car—Happenings of a Day.**

**HAMILTON, Dec. 14.—(Special.)**—The general sessions opened this afternoon, Judge Snider presiding. There were but two criminal cases, John Tagliero, charged with being the instigator of threatening "black hand" letters, and W. J. Smith, charged with obtaining goods by false pretences. The grand jury brought in a true bill against Smith. Frederick Foyester, who was injured by "Nimble Dick," one of the Hendrie Platers, was given a verdict of \$90 against the Dominion Guarantee and Accident Co.

Fire broke out in a G. T. R. freight car standing on the siding on the Old Beach line. The car was destroyed and the fire spread to the factory of the Smart-Turner Co., burning a large hole in the roof.

The temperance meetings were continued this evening, when Rev. Sam Small addressed a large gathering in the Charlton-avenue Methodist Church. H. E. Elmer presided.

**Assaulted With Iron Bar.**  
James Mackay, junior, of the Canadian Transfer Company, was the victim of an assault in which his arm was broken, and he received an ugly scalp wound. He has taken out a warrant against "Curly" Thompson, a driver, accusing him of the assault, and he says that he was assaulted with a heavy iron bar.

### MISER'S PASSION FOR ART

**Dane Who Inherited Fortune Leaves Remarkable Collection.**

**LONDON, Dec. 14.**—Some of the finest art treasures in existence may come into the market thru the recent death of George Saltling, a Dane, who inherited a great Australian fortune, and who devoted his whole life and income to art, but apart from this Saltling lived frugally in two rooms, which were crowded with priceless treasures. Popular report credited him with having never given a cent to charity and never spending one unnecessary penny on his person.

Saltling's collections of porcelain, on loan to the Kensington Museum, is the finest perhaps in the world. Many of the paintings he owned now hang in the national gallery.

### TWO ALDERMEN OR THREE?

**Belleisle's Ward System to Go Before a Judge.**

**BELLEVILLE, Dec. 14.**—A writ will be issued asking for an injunction against the city council to prevent the council putting in force a bylaw making two aldermen for each ward the number to be elected under the ward system, to which system the people voted to return at the last election. Opponents of the bylaw say the number should be three and that the statute calling for two aldermen is faulty. The council has voted \$25 towards the legal expenses of having the matter decided by a high court judge. It is expected that argument will be heard in Toronto on Thursday.

### ACQUITTED OF MURDER

**Girl Who Shot Faithless Lover Set Free by Jury.**

**PONTIAC, Mich., Dec. 14.**—Bertha Letzau, charged with shooting and killing S. J. Morley, a native of London, Ont., at Bloomfield Hills, a month ago, was to-day acquitted.

She testified that she had bought a revolver contemplating suicide when she learned of Morley's intended marriage to another woman, and that she could not remember what happened after Morley had laughed her on the night of the shooting.
