Wheat—The market opened %c to %c lower, with general selling of long wheat by commission houses and by some local holders. Around \$1.09½ the wheat was absorbed, and a rally to \$1.10% took place, with pit traders working on the bull side. The friends of wheat do not act so sure of their position as formerly, and certainly general speculative conditions are not conducive to higher prices, besides which real conditions, such as in visible reserves, are yet to be reckoned with.
