SIR DAVID BEATTY

born in County Wexford, 45 years ago. He entered the Britannia as a cadet in 1894, and by 1892 had attained the rank of lieutenant. Sir David Beatty's name will always be associated with that of Lord Kitchener, on affount of the part he pleyed in the Nile Expedition in 1896-8. He was one of the officers in charge of the gunboat flotilla which co-operated with the land troops. He was second in command at the forcing of the Dervish batteries at Hafir, and rendered excellent service in getting the gunboats over the cataracts.

At Hafir the flotilla came under heavy fire, Commander Colville was wounded, and Lieutenant Beatty took full charge. He fought the ships carefully, dismounter the enemy's guns, and gained the D. S. O. He took part in Kitchener's advance in 1898, and fought in the historic battles of Atbara and Khartoum. He was awarded the Order of Mejidieh (Fourth Class), and was promoted commander, being then twenty-seven years of age. In 1900 when the Chinese Boxer troubles took place he commanded the over the cataracts.

or age. In 1900 when the Chinese Boxer troubles took place he commanded the Barfleur. He fought a plucky engagement at Tientsin, and was twice wounded. His conduct in this affair gained him promotion and the distinction of being the youngest captain in the British navy. He was afterwards to be the youngest admiral

In 1906 he was promoted naval adviser to the army council. In 1910 he was promoted rear-admiral. The appointment was notable from the fact that as Admiral Beatty had not served the usul qualifying period for such proportion that Admiral Beatty had not served the usul qualifying period for such promotion, the difficulty had to be got over by the king signing a special order in council. Sir David Beatty thus became an admiral at the age of thirty-nine. The exceptional rapidity of his promotion is seen from the fact that he became admiral at an earlier age than nine-tenths. miral at an earlier age than nine-tenths miral at an earlier age than nine-tenths of his contemporaries succeeded in attaining the rank of captain. He, in 1912, received the important appointment of naval secretary to the First Lord of the Admiralty. His services in the present war at Heligoland, Dogger Bank, and Jutland are well known. Sir David Beatty married in 1910 a daughter of an American millionaire, Marshall Fild, of Chicago.
