**LAST NIGHT'S N. H. A. GAMES**

Montreal, March 1—Superior to Canadians in every department and at all times, Ottawa defeated the flying Frenchmen, three to one last night. The score was low, not because the Canadians were in any way equal to their opponents, but because they worked hard and saved themselves on many occasions. The failure to remain on the ice also cost the Canadians a goal, Ottawa securing one while Lalonde was at the side setting his skate repairs and Corbeau and Smith were on the penalty bench. In contrast to this, Ottawa played straight hockey from start to finish and only three of the visitors were penalized during the entire game.

Quebec, March 1—The Wanderers were simply overwhelmed by Quebec at the Arena tonight. The Bulldogs defeated the Red Hoops, seventeen to six, and the goal getting almost equalled the record score of the year, which was run up against Quebec by the 22nd, sixteen to nine.

The Montreals, who were minus Odie Cleghorn, tried hard to stay in the running during the first part of the game, but Quebec's passing game had them phased, while they were not strong on condition, Quebec having a big share in this respect.

**BRITISH SOCIALISTS AGAINST HOLDING OF PROPOSED CONGRESS**

London, March 1—The British Socialists have declined an invitation from the French Socialist party to send delegates to a congress of Socialists of the allied countries which it is proposed to hold on March 15. The British reply to the invitation says:—We are strongly of the opinion that the congress should not be held. The year 1917 is the most critical period of the war. The great majority of Socialists are fighting at the front to repel the German invasion and are unable either to attend as delegates or appoint others to be present in their place. Of the Socialists still at home a small but active minority consists of those who are demanding peace at any price. These anti-nationalists stand together in the support of a policy which cannot fail to encourage the aggressors. Even an overwhelming vote of the congress could not entirely outweigh the effect of a fierce internecine debate raised by a few advocates of non-resistance and socialism itself would suffer in the opinion of the world of workers, whence we must come out.

"We appeal to Socialists throughout the allied countries not to attend a congress which can only weaken the enemies of real socialism, strengthen the power of Chauvinism in Germany and greatly damage our cause."

**CATCH BASINS KEEP DEPARTMENT BUSY**

Employees of the water and sewerage department were at work all night thawing out frozen catch basins around the city. The alternate periods of thawing weather in day time and freezing at night are causing the department considerable trouble.

One of the most unusual difficulties due to frost located yesterday when it was discovered that the main sewer in Water street was frozen solid. The main is almost perfectly level and the flow did not develop sufficient pressure to keep it clear under present conditions. It was thawed out last night.

The night gang is continuing the work on Mill street for the connection with the drug company's sprinkler system. The work of excavation is difficult owing to the fact that the frost has penetrated four feet beneath the granite pavement.

The department is repairing today a leak in the water main in North street.

**FORGETTING SAFETY-FIRST**

A C. P. R. official said this morning that the "safety first" methods. During the last few days several persons had narrowly escaped being run over at the Mill street crossing in an endeavor to save a minute at the risk of their lives. He referred to one instance. A woman walked around the gates at the Mill street crossing and started across the tracks, while an engine was coming down the grade towards the station.
