

Utilities Board Acts in Matter of Extension to Little River

MORE HEARD ABOUT MERGER UP RIVER

Electrical Companies Getting Into Combination—N. B. Canning Industry

The Board of Public Utilities today, upon request of W. A. Ross, representing residents of East Saint John, ordered that a penalty of \$500 be imposed against the New Brunswick Power Co. for its failure to comply with the board's order last year instructing the company to extend its line to Red Head. The board, however, decided to give the company until June 15 in which to start actual operations, before the imposition of the fine.

Mr. Ross said that no work had been undertaken towards extending the line to Red Head, but that extensions and improvements were being made elsewhere. The penalty of \$500 is provided for by the Provincial Act governing the operations of the board.

UP RIVER MERGER

It developed at a hearing on the question of the payment of rates in the electric lighting system of Woodstock, that the consolidation of the electric light and power companies in Aroostook county Me., and in Victoria and Carleton counties, N. B., undertaken some time ago by a Chicago corporation is still in progress. E. R. Teed, of Woodstock, representing the Woodstock Electric Light and Power Co., now in the big company, said that besides the properties in Maine and New Brunswick controlled formerly by Hon. A. R. Gould, of Presque Isle, and other interests, the company had indicated their willingness to enter the combination, and that plans were being perfected to have all the remaining concerns in the counties of Victoria and Carleton enter the merger.

Should a general consolidation be made up the Saint John river, said Mr. Teed, application would be made to the Utilities Board for an approval of rates to be charged purchasers of light and power. The Woodstock question was deferred until a later date.

INSURANCE CASE OF INTEREST IN COUNTY COURT

Company Seeks to Recover After Paying St. Stephen Claim

In the County Court this morning, Judge J. A. Barry presiding, the case of the Mount Royal Assurance Company vs. Melvin Ross was commenced, and is being continued this afternoon.

The defendant, who is a resident of St. Stephen, had insured property under a policy from the plaintiff company in the sum of \$500, and suffered partial loss by fire, for which he was indemnified by the company to the extent of \$233.75, the full amount allowed on adjustment.

THE PLAINTIFF

The plaintiff is now suing for the recovery of this amount, maintaining that there was a breach of a statutory condition in the policy because, it is alleged, at the time the defendant effected the insurance, he had other insurance to the amount of \$800 with the Howard Merchants Agency at Calais, and that he gave the plaintiff no notice of this concurrent insurance.

The plaintiff also contends that, in his proof of loss, Mr. Ross stated that he had no other insurance than that taken out with the Mount Royal.

The defendant denies that, in his proof of loss, he made any such statement, and maintains that, at the time the insurance was effected with the Mount Royal, the plaintiff company knew of the existence of the other policy.

Judgment had been obtained by the plaintiff in this case for want of appearance by the defendant, but the judge, who said that he did not appreciate the case for want of appearance, permitted the defendant to appear and to defend and continue the action on payment of the amount of the claim and costs in the sum of \$100.

At the trial, Mr. McInerney appeared for the company and E. Earle B. Smith for the defendant.

Amateur Athletic Session in This City September 9, 10 and 11

The annual Canadian track and field championships will be held in Port Arthur and Fort William on July 31 and August 2. The preliminaries will be held on Saturday with the finals on Monday. The Maritime track and field championships will be held in Moncton at a date to be set. Last year these events were run off at Charlottetown.

The New Brunswick Basketball Association, Mr. Stirling said, would be represented at a meeting in Montreal on Saturday by Walter R. Golding, manager of the Trojans.

PLAN EGG CIRCLE

Meeting Held Last Evening in Agricultural Hall at St. Martins

A meeting of the St. Martins Agricultural Society was held in the Agricultural Hall at St. Martins last evening, called to discuss poultry raising and the organization of an egg circle. J. C. Boyer, president, conducted the meeting and A. R. Jones, manager of the N. B. poultry exchange, spoke on the poultry situation in the province. He referred to opportunities for poultry raising, and spoke of the outlook for higher prices next winter, due to the poor hatch of chickens this spring throughout the country. He also explained the egg circle organization which now comprises 55 egg circles and approximately 1,000 members.

Some discussion took place, led by M. Kelly, F. Hoy, A. F. Bentley and others, who were in favor of promoting poultry work. At the close a committee was formed to canvass the district, and to make arrangements if possible for the organization of an egg circle in St. Martins. The meeting was attended by many of the ladies, as well as the men in the district.

JURORS IN SAINT JOHN REQUEST \$3 DAY IN FEES

Petition by Panel of Last Circuit Presented to Municipality

COMPENSATION AT PRESENT \$1 DAILY

Set Forth Change in Law and Action in Other Counties

The members of the petit jury who attended the recent Circuit Court for the City and County of Saint John presented a petition to the municipality, today, through Hon. R. W. Wigmore, warden, asking that their compensation, and that of all subsequent petit jurors, be increased from \$1 a day to \$3. The petitioners feel that as other municipalities in the province have fixed the fee at \$3, as authorized by an act of the legislature, this municipality should make the same advance. In the other municipalities jurors receive mileage as well as \$3 a day. George Carvill, foreman of the Saint John jury, said today. After a conference with Warden Wigmore, Mr. Carvill presented the petition, which is as follows:

THE PETITION.

To Honorable R. W. Wigmore, Warden, and Members of the Municipality of the City and County of Saint John:

The petition of members of the petit jury who have attended the present Circuit Court for the City and County of Saint John humbly sheweth:

1. That your petitioners are the members of the petit jury for the present Circuit Court for the City and County of Saint John, and in the discharge of their duty as such, have attended daily during the time the said court was in session, except when occasionally relieved by the presiding judge, until today, when they were discharged from further attendance.

2. That, as your petitioners understand, although the law, which was changed some years ago so as to provide for an increase in jurors' fees, has been brought into force in several municipalities, including York, Queens and other counties, your petitioners were surprised to find that it had not yet become effective in the City and County of Saint John, and, feeling that an injustice is done those who are summoned to attend as petit jurors, to the great and serious loss in many cases occasioned to their business as well as a very considerable sacrifice of their own time and convenience, they have to submit, they feel that compensation of \$1 per day is totally inadequate, and they would respectfully request that steps be taken at once to provide for the additional increase of \$2 per day as provided for in the act passed in 1919, and that your petitioners be given the benefit of the increase for their attendance at the present circuit, as well as the petit jurors hereafter attending circuit or county courts in the City and County of Saint John.

That under the present system of selecting petit jurors by lot, those thus chosen have no option but to attend under the alternative of a considerable fine, and it would therefore seem only just that fair and reasonable provision should be made for compensating those who are thus compulsorily forced to attend petit jury duty.

Your petitioners therefore respectfully pray that the increase asked for may be granted to them and all persons hereafter serving as petit jurors at the circuit or county courts for the City and County of Saint John, and in duty bound will ever pray.
