## SPORT NEWS OF A DAY: HOME AND ABROAD

### BOWLING.

**Games Last Evening.**  
In the Clerical League, Goodwin's, Linnell, and the Atlantic Sugar Refineries teams split even, each taking two points. The former totaled 1,246 and the latter 1,246.  
In the Commercial League, Emerson & Fisher took all four points from Brock & Patterson. The winners totaled 1,270 and the losers 1,198. In the second game the Sugar Refinery team took three points from the Imperial Optical Company. The winners totaled 1,238, and the losers 1,208.  
In the Wellington League the Canadian National Express took three points from the Purity Ice Cream Company. The winners totaled 1,255, and the losers 1,226.  
In the Y. M. C. A. League, the Wanderers and Crescents split even, each taking two points. The former totaled 1,230, and the latter 1,230.  
In the McAvilly League, the King street office took all four points from the King street wholesale men. The winners totaled 1,853, and the losers 1,260.  
In the Y. M. C. A. League, the Swans took three points from the Pelicans. The winners totaled 1,871, and the losers 1,288.  
In the Garrison League, Headquarters took all four points from the 6th Signal Company. The winners totaled 1,183, and the losers 1,099. A company took all four points from C. A. S. C. The winners totaled 1,125 and the losers 1,064.

### THE RING.

**Condemn Pro Boxing.**  
A strongly worded resolution, moved by Rev. Wesley Megaw and seconded by Rev. Orr Bennett, condemning the proposed introduction of professional boxing into Ottawa, was passed at a meeting of the Ottawa Presbytery on Tuesday. The discussion which followed this motion vigorously favored the continuation of amateur sports in Ottawa, and was opposed to any step to allow professional boxing to get a foothold in the city.

### FOOTBALL.

**Will Visit Canada.**  
The Australian rugby team now playing in Northern Union series in England, will play a series of matches in Canada on its way home next spring. Dal Thomas, former Welsh international star, now resident in British Columbia, has been asked to arrange and manage the tour. He expects to stage a game each in Montreal, Winnipeg, Vancouver, Victoria, Seattle and possibly in Philadelphia.

### Kings and Acadia Tie.

Wolfville, N. S., Nov. 3.—Acadia University and Kings College, Windsor, rugby teams, played a 3-3 tie in an exhibition game here today as their previous game at Windsor. Acadia's superiority in the forward line, and Kings' advantage in a speedy and smooth working half line, featured the game.

### WRESTLING.

**Lewis Defeats J. Polk.**  
New York, Nov. 3.—Ed. "Strangler" Lewis, former heavyweight wrestling champion, tonight defeated Joe Polk, inter-allied title holder, in a two-fall match. The first fall was gained after six minutes, forty seconds with a double wrist-lock and the second in four minutes, nineteen seconds with a double body hold.

## GET NEARER TO HOCKEY RINK

**Promoters Find Good Support and There Should be Definite Word in a Few Days.**

That St. John is to have a hockey rink is practically assured. At a special meeting of the promoters held in the mayor's office yesterday afternoon, it was decided that sufficient money had already been guaranteed to build one of the two types under consideration. A meeting will be held on next Tuesday when it is hoped to complete arrangements and have the work started immediately. It has been practically decided to erect the rink on the site of the old car barn in Main street, opposite Albert.

This is great news to hockey and skating fans throughout the city. That this city is and has been badly in need of such a rink is evident. Hockey has been one of the chief winter sports in the Maritime provinces, but during the last few years St. John boys have been denied the pleasure of participating to any marked degree because they had no rink. A handful of enthusiasts kept the game alive by practicing on City Lake and on open air rinks and that prevented it from being relegated to "old time sport." If the plans materialize, St. John should be in a position to cater to up-to-date hockey and skating fans. A rink can be depended upon to uphold the honors of their home town. A rink co-operation on the part of local sports and citizens in general should make the rink assured. From present indications St. John is coming back to its own.

### C. N. R. RAIL ORDER

#### PLACING THIS WEEK

A continuance of active operations in the rail mills at Saint John, Marie and Sydney is likely as a result of the splitting of a \$4,000,000 order between these two producers by the Canadian National Railways. Negotiations have been proceeding for some time and, according to semi-official information, the business is likely to be placed within a few days. It is noteworthy that the United States Steel Corporation and leading independent producers lowered their price on steel rails to \$20, Pittsburgh basis, within the past ten days. This is a reduction of \$7 per ton. It is anticipated that 20,000 tons will be placed with each of the two companies.

**NATIONAL TRAINS TO HALT FOR TWO-MINUTE PAUSE**  
All trains operating on the Canadian National Railways will be stopped for the observance of the two-minute silence in commemoration of the sons of Canada who sleep in Flanders fields. Instructions to this effect were issued by President D. McHanna of the C. N. R. The president's order in part reads: "It has been arranged with the Operating Department that the movement of trains on the Canadian National Railways, as far as can be done consistent with safety, will be stopped for two minutes, beginning at eleven o'clock, Friday morning, November 11, observing local time in each locality, and it is desired that the same action be taken with all the activities of the system. The head of each department will therefore please arrange as far as possible to have all work suspended for two minutes, commencing at the hour mentioned."
