## FOR BORDER LIQUOR WAR.

Sub Chaser, Airship and Armed Cars to Operate.

Ogdensburg, N. Y., Aug. 1.—The former submarine chaser CS-483 has arrived here to aid in the warfare against liquor smuggling from the Canadian side of the border. Much surplus war material of the federal government is now assembled here. Officials assert that the campaign against rum running will be prosecuted vigorously with naval craft, coast guard cutters, airships, armored cars and high-powered motor trucks.

Two powerful trucks, part of a fleet of forty-eight, to be sent to Northern New York, already are here. Each will carry government agents armed with rifles and pistols and will operate in this customs district, being used chiefly to blockade the highways when word is received that a cargo of contraband has left the border, bound south.

Airplanes, submarine chasers and coast guard cutters are to patrol the St. Lawrence River, which in the past has been the highway for liquor smugglers. Recent despatches from Ottawa and Montreal asserted that the Canadian authorities would co-operate with United States agents in an attempt to shut off the flow of liquor into this country.

## 24 FINED FOR TARRING MAN.

Farmers Convicted in Michigan Court Pay \$600 for Attack.

East Saugatuck, Mich., Aug. 1.—Twenty-four farmers living near here paid fines aggregating \$600 in Justice Court as a result of conviction of charges growing out of the tarring and feathering of Bert Lenters. Lenters was taken from his bed, led into his own farm yard and coated with tar and feathers because he was alleged to have made disparaging remarks concerning the community minister.

After the farmers applied the coat of tar, according to the victim, they stuck feathers one at a time to his body, endeavoring to create fancy designs. "Tarring of this, the victim says, his assailants covered him from head to foot with the feathers.

## INFLUENZA KILLS MANY LAKE ATHABASCA INDIANS

Edmonton, Alta., Aug. 1.—Indians are dying off at the posts on Lake Athabasca, due to the influenza scourge which has been playing havoc with the lives of the aborigines since last summer, according to reports brought from the north country by trappers arriving here.

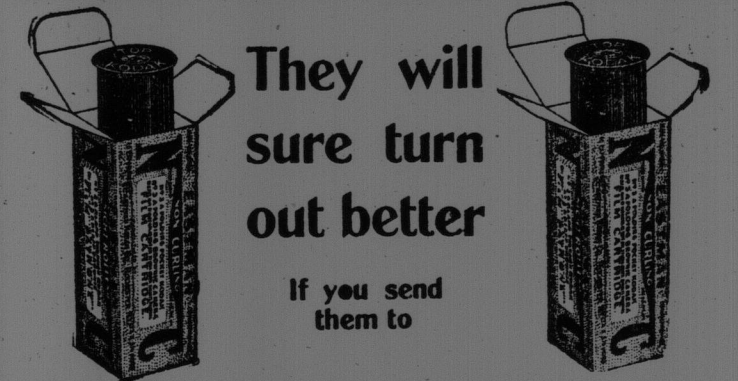

## JOHN SAD IS MADE HAPPY.

Is Freed From Jail to Even Arrears in Alimony.

Peekskill, Aug. 1.—John Sad is the opposite of what his name implies as a result of being released, by an order just made by Justice A. H. Seeger of the Supreme Court, from jail, where he had been confined for eleven months as a civil prisoner for failure to pay his wife alimony.

Sad returned to Peekskill from the Westchester county jail, where he had been since Aug. 26 of last year. His wife, Naomi Sad, alleged he was in arrears with alimony, and the court felt that it would be better to release him and give him a chance to earn money.

## MANITOBA HAS MILLION DOLLAR SCHOOL FOR DEAF

Winnipeg, August 1.—Complete with all modern conveniences, Manitoba's new \$1,000,000 school for the deaf will be formally opened in September. It is a spacious building of gray stone and of pleasing design with a large central tower. The school is replete with classrooms, clinic rooms and one of modern equipment. A theatre for moving pictures and pantomime teaching is also a feature of the school.

For boy pupils there is a printing shop, while girls will be taught dress-making and other household arts. There are eight class rooms on the ground floor and in these rooms generous space is given to blackboards. Stand mirrors for "lip" or "speech" reading also are installed.

## BOY WHO DREW TOY PISTOL ON POLICEMEN IS SHOT

Detroit, Mich., Aug. 1.—Harry Watson, fifteen years of age, tried to "bluff" two policemen with his toy pistol. The officers, believing that the boy's weapon was genuine, fired upon him, and Harry is in a hospital near death.

Locating him in an alley, they called upon him to surrender, but he drew the supposedly genuine pistol from his pocket and warned the patrolmen he was about to fire.
