TO IMPORT CAMELS FOR THE U. S. DESERT

Texas Stockmen Bring Two Hundred From Orient to Go Where Astor Fall

Pueblo, Colo., June 27—J. H. Trimble, one of the chief stockmen of Texas, is at the head of an association which proposes to transport camels from the oriental deserts to those of New Mexico, Arizona and California, and the semi-arid wastes of Texas. The association proposes to import 300 camels and place them on a ranch on the Rio Grande about 150 miles south of Cape Verde.

The areas mentioned, although they offer great possibilities to the seeker after valuable metals, are little traversed, either by railroads or wagon roads, such as would be suitable for motor traffic, for the soil, which is largely drifting sand, makes the construction of durable roadways impossible.

Naples, June 27—The authorities have unearthed the bodies of a large number of infants buried in the garden attached to a large villa occupied by a midwife named Bertoli.
