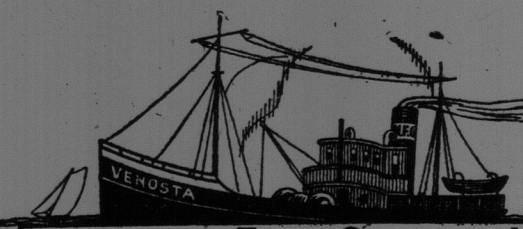

## ICE PATROL SIGHTS WARTIME MINE IN NORTH ATLANTIC

Boston, March 22.—A floating mine,  
believed to be one of those laid in the  
North Sea during the war, was sighted  
by the ice patrol in the North At-  
lantic yesterday, according to a wire-  
less report received here. The mine  
was lost sight of while efforts to de-  
stroy it were being made and search  
was started, the message added, to re-  
discover it. Whether it is still charged  
is not known.

## QUESTIONS ABOUT LIQUOR TRAFFIC

**Matter Under Discussion in  
the Legislature Yesterday  
—Had Substantial Profit.**

With reference to the New Brun-  
swick Board of Liquor Commissioners  
the following questions and answers  
were given in the Legislature yester-  
day:

Hon. Mr. Veniot in reply to Mr.  
Smith, Albert.

1. How much liquor had the Liquor  
Licence Commission in stock at the be-  
ginning of the present fiscal year?

Answer—Duty paid merchandise  
valued at \$61,381.28; duty paid mer-  
chandise valued at \$118,968.10. Total,  
\$179,349.38.

2. These figures include the total cost  
of freight to Fredericton, also the  
amount of \$555.43 for containers which  
are returnable.

3. How much has been bought since  
that date?

Answer—\$182,311.95, including cost  
of freight and insurance to Fredericton.

4. How much is in stock at present?

Answer—In bond, 6,738 cases white-  
key, 235 cases brandy, 1,564 cases gin,  
50 cases rum, 20 octaves rum. Excise,  
325 cases whiskey, 800 cases gin, 340  
gallons alcohol.

5. Out of bond—Duty paid, 1,037 cases  
whiskey, 705 cases wine, 108 cases  
brandy, 307 cases gin, 10 cases rum, 10  
octaves rum, 146 gallons alcohol, 20  
barrels ale and stout.

6. How many persons, including the  
commissioners themselves, are in re-  
ceipt of salaries or emoluments of the  
board? What salary does each re-  
ceive, and what duties are performed  
in respect thereof?

Answer—Eleven persons employed,  
including commissioners. For salaries  
see Comptroller-General's report.

7. What is the total cost since the  
establishment of the board down to the  
present time of administering the  
business carried on?

Liquor Profits.  
Fredericton, N. B., March 21.—The  
report of the Board of Liquor Com-  
missioners of New Brunswick for the  
year ending on Oct. 31, 1922, tabled  
in the Legislature this afternoon by  
Hon. P. J. Veniot, Premier of the  
province, shows a net profit on trans-  
actions of the commission of \$340,  
489.12. This is reduced by \$35,000 writ-  
ten off for the purchase of the Queen  
hotel property, until recently used as  
a warehouse by the commission, leav-  
ing a balance of \$305,489.12.

The total indebtedness incurred by  
the commission during the year is set  
down at \$999,437.57, the largest items  
therein being \$541,845.88 for customs  
charges and \$416,118.07 for purchase  
of liquors.

On the credit side the total is \$1,  
339,926.99 and is made up of \$1,290,  
833.22 in receipts from vendors and  
small refunds, \$1,400 rent from the  
Queen hotel property and \$48,193.77 in-  
ventory, accounts receivable, etc.

ment by the customs authorities of an

**WOULD REFORM  
UPPER HOUSE**

(Canadian Press Despatch.)  
Ottawa, March 21.—Hon. W. S.  
Fielding, minister of finance, submitted  
to the House of Commons today  
a scheme of senate reform. In brief,  
he was not speaking for the Govern-  
ment but expressing a personal view  
—provided for a nominated Senate  
as follows:

1. One-half nominated (as the Senate  
is now nominated) by the Dominion  
Government and to be known as Do-  
minion Senators.

2. One-half nominated by the Pro-  
vincial Governments and to be known  
as Provincial Senators.

The nominations would be for a  
period of ten years with eligibility to  
a second term. At eighty years of  
age Senators would be retired. Mr.  
Fielding would not disturb existing  
Senators, but would give them the  
right to retire at seventy-five on a  
pension of two-thirds of their present  
indemnity.

**AFRICAN KING WHO MET  
LIVINGSTONE DIES AT 95**  
Chief of Bamangwato Proved Saviour  
of Tribe in Central Africa.  
London, Feb. 28.—(By mail.)—King  
Khama, chief of the Bamangwato, who  
died recently, at his capital, Serowe, at  
the age of ninety-five, as a boy in his  
early teens, met David Livingstone on  
the explorer's first journey into Central  
Africa.  
Khama's father was a witch doctor  
as well as chief. The tribe was being  
reduced in numbers and power by the  
Matabele, under Lobengula, but when  
Khama took the reins of power he  
broke the Matabele's strength, and  
throughout his whole life the Bamang-  
wato have become stronger every  
day.  
He became a Christian in his early  
twenties, and immediately fought the  
drink habits of his tribe, and expelled
