Almost the last business transacted by the Local House was the adoption by the House of an address asking the appointment of a Commission to enquire into and investigate the bribery conspiracy. The Commission is to be composed of three judges, one at least of whom is to be a judge of the Supreme Court of Judicature of Ontario. The Commission is to be appointed by the Government, and the powers conferred upon it are ample for the most searching enquiry into the whole conspiracy. A sum of \$10,000 has been voted to defray the expenses of the Commission, which is instructed to make "searching investigation" which the gravity of this latest attempt at corruption demands.

The Senate has refused to sanction Mr. Charlton's Bill for the punishment of seduction and false oaths. The House of Commons, while it does not approve of the interference of the Senate with the legislation of the popular House, we are not sorry for the fate of Mr. Charlton's Bill. The moral effect of the idea that woman must be the guardian of her own virtue, and that the punishment for seduction is to be inflicted by the law, will be a good one. The all-night session of the Ontario Legislature, which closed at quarter to one on Tuesday morning, 29th ult., was the latest but one in eleven years, and was marked by one amendment after another moved by the Opposition, without affecting the solid majority of the Government. There were twenty divisions taken, an exceptionally large number for one day's session. The whole number of previous divisions in the session was only eight. The amendments were chiefly in regard to Licensure Duties, the Rivers and Streams Bill, and the amendments to the Election Act. On the latter Mr. Nelson voted with the Opposition; in almost every other vote he supported the Government, as he has voted in nearly all the other divisions of the session. At the first division there were only 60 members present, and the Government suffered relatively more than the Opposition, the vote standing 30 to 27. On the next division a straight vote of 39 to 26 occurred, and during the remainder of the session the Government majority maintained about the same figure, and on one occasion was fourteen.

PAID MEMBERS OF PARLIAMENT.

So many "crooked" men have been brought to light in our legislatures, and so many bills are passed by our representatives that would not be sustained by the people had they a direct voice in the matter, that we feel justified in saying there is a screw loose somewhere in our legislative system. Our American countrymen, whom we know to be far from spotless, look upon our House of Commons as a political pandemonium and hold up our representatives as examples of corruption. The same opinion is held, and frequently expressed, by many earnest, thoughtful men in this country. Every one of us can call to mind several gentlemen who entered the political arena poor and obscure, and are now, through subtle astorial trickery, rich and well known. Not one of us would call the selfishness they have not only enriched themselves through "eminent services rendered" but have scattered large sums of public money broadcast upon the people who have the good fortune to be related to them. Such a glorious opportunity to make money is not to be slighted by needy men who have, what we often hear called "the gift of gab," and who prefer living by their wits to living by labor. It seems as if those who framed our system of government had not such a liberal reward in the consequences, it is possible have become a trade, and a man can earn just as much at the trade of law-making, as he could if he were to turn burglar and make law-breaking his occupation, practised by the two are equally identical, the law-maker is never punished, but receives punishment for his law-breaking brother.

Look at the class this system draws to our legislative hall! What interest have they in the welfare of Canada? What care they for the laws they make? They depend upon their seat for their living and upon this position in parliament to make money. We do not see any of this base-faced corruption in the British House of Commons, because the members have nothing to gain there unless they are able to make use of the community, and thereby their own interests as part of that community. No member of the British Commons receives a cent for his time or services, and the consequence is, the people get no advantage for representatives, but men who have a large interest in the community and whose prosperity or adversity is bound up with that of the nation.
