Something About Sawdust. As sawdust is a very plentiful production from lumber largely manufactured, any facts concerning it will be of interest.

The hearing of the case of Neil Campbell, of Tracadie charged by Joseph Hache, mail-driver between Chatham and Tracadie with assault with intent to do grievous bodily harm, was continued on Saturday last before G. A. Blair, Esq., Police Magistrate, Mr. Tweedie appearing for the accused. The proceedings were as follows:—

Annie Whelan—witness. I live at Joseph Campbell's house. I saw Campbell on Saturday 14th July. Campbell was a passenger on that day and was in the wagon at Tracadie. He was on the other side of the river when I first saw him. When I got into the wagon Campbell took the mail bag out of the wagon and tied it on the trunk behind him. He handed over to me a small bundle, which I carried to the house. Campbell did not seem to mind and said it would be all right to take it. I carried it to the house and I saw Campbell when he was driving on. I saw Campbell and Campbell said I should not. At this Hache jumped out of the wagon and went to the head and told Campbell to get out of the wagon, and Campbell said he would not do so for the men around there. Campbell then took a revolver out of his pocket and fired it upwards and Hache turned his horse on the road and called for assistance several times. I saw Campbell striking Hache two or three times. Campbell then got out of the wagon and drove away. I did not see any sign of Hache on that day.

Mr. Tweedie—small figure in the wagon after Campbell got out. Do you think there would have been any trouble if Hache had driven along and not minded Campbell? I don't think there would have been much trouble.

Were you afraid of Campbell? I was not afraid of him. I was disturbed. Campbell seemed perfectly full of himself. Campbell did not give you cause to complain about him? Campbell, so far as I was concerned, I did not see him throw any mail bags out of the wagon. I saw him point out the fire and I saw Hache. He aimed upwards when he fired the shot. I don't think there was any trouble about the mail bag from Campbell. I saw Campbell reach over and take Hache's whippers—out of fun I think. Hache drove off very fast from Campbell and going down said he would shoot Campbell through. He talked a good deal about the affair after we drove from Campbell's place. He said that Campbell shot was fired. I don't think there was any trouble about Hache delivering the mail at Tracadie. Campbell did not shoot Hache and did not throw the mail bags out of the wagon. Campbell wanted to drive on. The witness went to turn the horse. The annoyance I experienced was that of sitting behind a horse that was drunk.

By the Magistrate—What caused you to say if you knew this was the passage you were going to have you would be in Newcastle yet? He had been putting his hands on me. Did you see Campbell strike Hache? He struck Hache two or three times after he got out of the wagon to turn the horse.

Did you complain to Hache of Campbell's behaviour? I only complained of it once. I said if I had known the passage I was to have I would have been in Newcastle yet.

To Mr. Tweedie—I could not say anything would have gone along all right if Hache had driven along and not minded Campbell; could not say anything Campbell struck the revolver several times or not.

To the Magistrate—Campbell was angry and violent when he struck Hache; did not see Hache make any blow at Campbell. Hache had hold of the horse's head when Campbell fired the pistol. It was when Campbell fired the pistol that caused Hache to get out and turn the horse. I was afraid only when the revolver went off. It was about dark when the revolver was fired. Before Hache got out I saw Campbell seize the reins and throw the horse upon his haunches. I did not see Campbell strike Hache before Hache got out.

I would not have been alarmed to go on with Campbell in the wagon. The mail bags were under our feet when I got in and gave me more room when Campbell removed them.

At this point Mr. Tweedie addressed the Court stating that although it was evident an assault had been committed, it had also been shown that no attempt to do grievous bodily harm had been made. It was quite probable that the Grand Jury would find a bill at all, even if the case were sent up, and the only result would be that the county would be put to expense that was entirely unnecessary. As best the affair was not an assault by a man under the influence of liquor; whether Hache had also been drinking he could not say, but he believed that he had exercised common prudence the whole difficulty might have been avoided. He (Mr. T.) was willing provided the charge of an attempt to do grievous bodily harm was dismissed to accept arrest and plead guilty to the act of his client to what really happened—an assault.

The Magistrate said there was a complaint for assault as well as attempt to do grievous bodily harm. The witness of the complainant just examined had certainly weakened the complainant's case, but he would go on, if there were other witnesses.

William Loggie, of Lower Newcastle, was then called and sworn. He testified as follows:—

On the evening of 14th July I was standing in the barn at home after sundown and saw the mail driver coming down the road with two passengers—a lady and gentleman. I felt the horse and went to get the mail was standing at the gate when Hache dropped the reins; Campbell reached over and picked them up; Hache ordered him to drop them and at the same time jerked them out of his hands. I then walked over to the wagon and Hache asked me to take the mail bag in. I was about half way to the house when I heard a noise down the road, and saw a flash and heard a report. I saw the blue rags on the side of the wagon and saw that it was Campbell and took the horse by the head. The horse's head was then thrown up the road towards me. I saw Campbell shaking Hache—did not see him strike him. Hache gave his horse the charge to run and went up to get the mail. Campbell did not appear cross when I saw him.

To Mr. Tweedie—Campbell seemed a
