





Extracts from "The St. John City As-sessment Law of 1889." "Sec. 118. The Assessors shall ascer-tain, as nearly as possible, the partic-ulars of the Real Estate, the Personal Estate, and the Income of any person who has not brought in a statement in accordance with their notice, and as re-quired by this Law, and shall make an estimate thereof, at the true value and amount, to the best of their informa-tion and belief; and such estimate shalt be conclusive upon all persons who have not filed their statements in due time, unless they can show a reason-

have not filed their statements in due time, unless they can show a reason-able excuse for the omission." "Sec. 138. No person shall have an abatement unless he has filed with the Assessors the statement, under oath, within the time hereinbefore required; nor shall the Common Council in any such asses sustein an appeal from the nor shall the Common Council in any such case, sustain an appeal from the judgment of the Assessors, unless they shall be satisfied that there was good cause why the statement was not filed
