OLD ENGLAND WELCOMES COLONIES' OFFER OF AID

LONDON, March 26.—At the admiralty office great interest was manifested today in the report that Canada would make an offer of naval assistance to Great Britain and that the feeling among the Canadian Ministers was favorable to the building of one, and possibly two Dreadnoughts. This, with the actual and prospective offer of similar Dreadnoughts from other British colonies, notably New Zealand and Australia, has opened up new possibilities of naval expansion. Aside from the willingness of the colonies to contribute naval assistance gives a practical view to the long-cherished dream of Imperial federation in which the mother country and her colonies will have a common interest.

The naval programme outlined by the first lord of the admiralty contemplates that the home government shall have fourteen vessels of the Dreadnought type by the end of next year. Since this programme was announced New Zealand's offer of a Dreadnought, fully equipped and without cost to the home government, has been officially accepted. The New Zealand offer also contemplates the gift of a second Dreadnought if events make it necessary. The Australian colonial Dreadnought, while not making the specific offer of a Dreadnought, has given assurance that Australia's resources will be at the disposal of the home government in time of emergency. The Australian people, not content with this action, are urging the colonial government to make a specific offer of a Dreadnought, and in

the meantime large popular subscriptions are being raised for the construction of battleships. The disposition of Canada to offer naval assistance, with possibly one or two Dreadnoughts, is welcomed as a further evidence of colonial and Imperial loyalty. Whether it will be feasible for the colonies to control the movements of their warships in time of peace, naval experts are not prepared to say. But it is thought that a plan could be devised by which the colonial Dreadnoughts, while a part of the British navy, would be assigned to duty in colonial waters. In the aggregate the colonies could probably furnish six Dreadnoughts in case of emergency, in addition to the fourteen vessels of this type contemplated by the programme of the admiralty.

BUTTER TAKES A BIG SLUMP

Householders will delight to hear that the price of butter has shown a marked decrease during the past week. The price asked is 20 to 22 cents for tub butter and 25 cents for pound rolls. This is considerably cheaper than during the same season in previous years. In fact many dealers appear confident that the high prices have faded away and in future good quality at low price may be looked for. In other lines the market is quite strong. The usual meats are on hand and prices show but slight variation. There is a big demand for veal, but the quantity is limited. Ten to fourteen cents per pound for the carcass is the price asked. In connection with the butter supply a well known market dealer informed The Sun last evening that the cold storage butter was also on the market.

Lettuce and radishes and other green stock are not arriving. About six cents a dozen is being asked in some quarters. Potatoes are bringing from \$1.35 to \$1.75 a barrel; turnips, 80 cents; beets and carrots, \$1.50. Yesterday's storm cleared away what little snow remained on the roads. Wheels are now being used to convey the produce to market.

BOSTON, March 26.—The baseball season has apparently opened unofficially on the playgrounds and vacant lots. The college baseball season opened on Wednesday with Princeton leading off. The National and American League teams are playing practice games in the South and will begin the official season in about two weeks. The weather here is spring like and reasonable.
